GEORGE CLARE MARTIN, 29-year-old defenceman, is a native of Waterloo, Ont. Martin joined Boston Bruins in 1941, then spent three years in the armed forces. Krause saved well from D. Gomez, but in the resulting scramble Cameron fastened on to a loose ball and equalized. Murray was just too high with a fine drive. The Battery lost one of their players when Zaccarelli incurred referee Flie's displeasure and was sent off. Sunberg cleared well and then Cameron added his second goal with a fine drive to put the Battery ahead for the first time. Ford (Sr.) saved shakily but got the ball away. Sunberg was sound and Murray again shot high.

The Battery pressed on and Cameron shot wide. Dunbar took the ball up field and from his good pass Jerry Ford added a third for the Battery. Krause brought off a sensational save from Ford when he turned the latter's close-up drive against the upright from where it rebounded into play and was cleared.

Play was fast with the ball being taken from end to end and both defences being tested. Bowman shot wide. Ford (Sr.) saved three times in succession and then in a flash Jerry Ford was through at the other end only to be dispossessed by Sunberg in a strong driving tackle. Back came the Legion and Murray, Bowman and Gomez combined for Gomez to score a second goal for the Legion. Both teams tried hard for another goal but full time came with the Battery holding on to their one-goal lead.

Billy Gomez did well and Alexander was strong. Bremner was fair. The forwards lacked finishing drive. White was good and Murray got a good goal but disappointed at times. Bowman was fair.

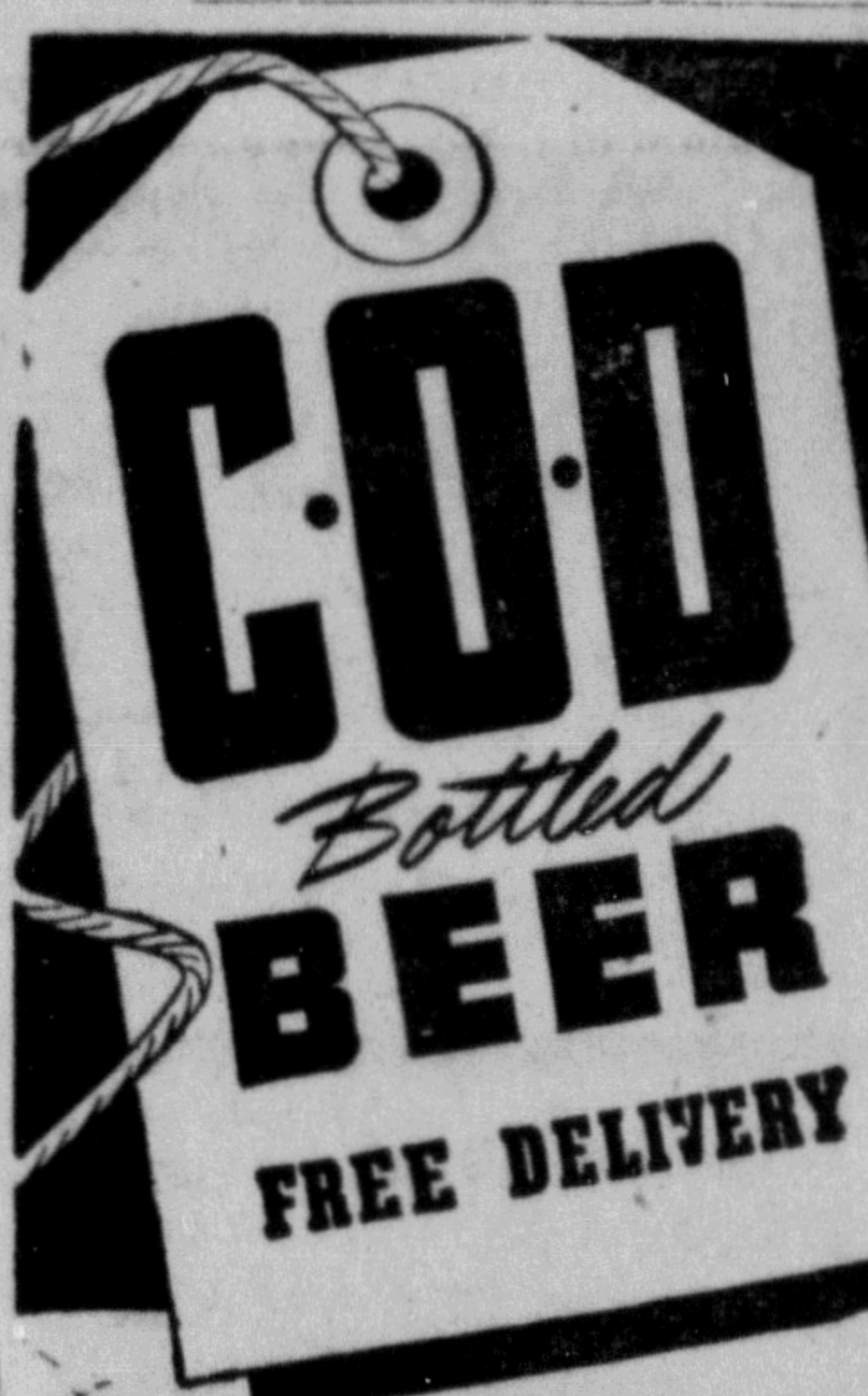
However, all players must be congratulated on their willingness. It is hard to play when short-handed but they put everything they had into the match and the result was a fast

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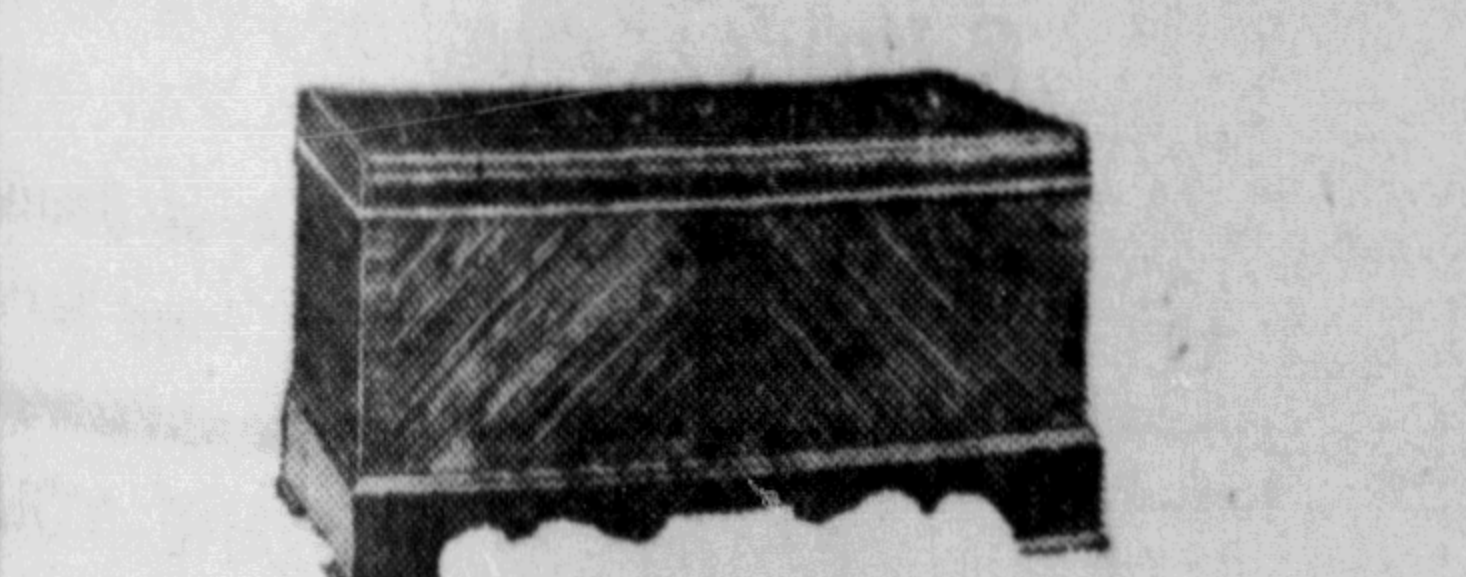
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
