

TOKYO (CP)—The United Nations command admitted tonight that one of its planes had strafed neutral zone by mistake yesterday.

The Reds had charged that the plane had raked the site of the suspended armistice talks before dawn Monday.

regrets this violation of agreed neutrality which resulted from a pilot's error in navigation. Appropriate disciplinary action being initiated."

The Allied reply notes that no casualties were inflicted and only light damage was caused.
