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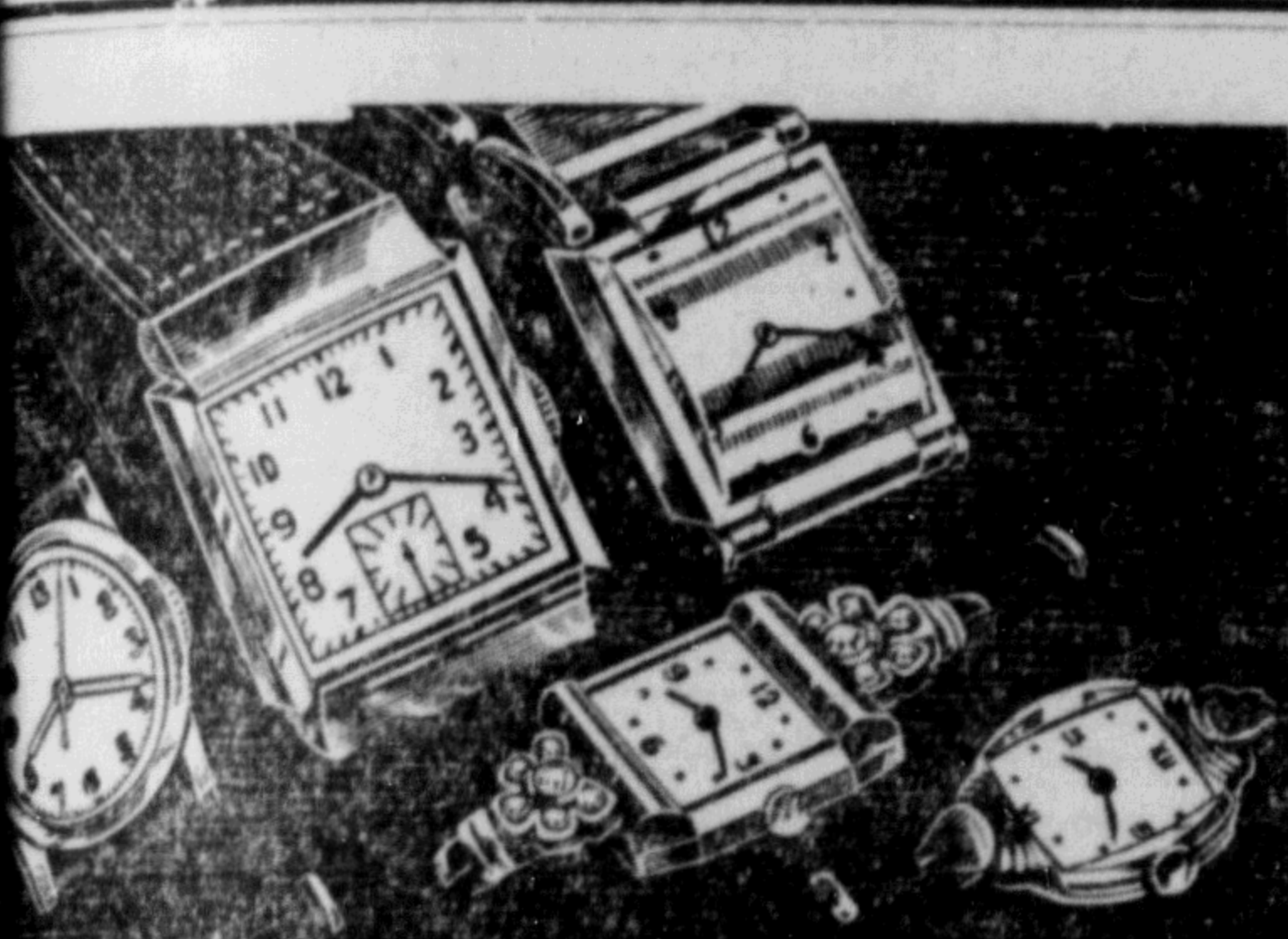


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H. B. Rochester returned to Vancouver on the Chilcotin after spending the last few weeks in the city.
