

### Pulp Mill on Arrow Lakes

It is considered possible that a \$75,000,000 pulp and newsprint plant for the Columbia Cellulose Co. Ltd. will be established on the Arrow Lakes, in southern British Columbia, following a recent investigation of proposed site.

A survey by Howard Keed and Bert Tremblay reports large and satisfactory stands of spruce and hemlock for producing high grades of alpha pulp.

Power could be available from the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co.

### Ships and Waterfront

Canadian Pacific Steamship Princess Norah, Capt. A. J. Campbell, arrived in port at 9:30 a.m. with 42 passengers on board and 129 tons of cargo. Passengers leaving from Vancouver for Kemano Bay numbered 67, for Kitimat 40. Freight for Kemano amounted to 86 tons; for Kitimat 49 tons. Leaving Prince Rupert, 60 men will embark for the Alcan projects at Kitimat and Kemano Bay.

Southbound from Skagway, CPR freighter Yukon Princess, under charter to the Frank Waterhouse line, arrived in port at 3:30 yesterday afternoon. The vessel took on water and stores here and loaded canned salmon from the Canadian Fishing Co.'s cannery at the ocean dock before proceeding in the evening to Alice Arm to load concentrates. From Alice Arm she heads for Port Alice and then to Vancouver.

Union steamer Coquitlam, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 2:30 yesterday afternoon from Vancouver and sailed at 11 p.m. for her regular weekly voyage to Alice Arm, Stewart and other northern points. The vessel is due back here tomorrow morning to sail south at noon. On board the Coquitlam this week as purser is the well known Gerry Foote, regularly of the Chilcotin on the summer tourist run, who is relieving Purser A. W. Robinson for one trip.

Second Union liner of the day, the Chilcotin, Capt. James Hunter, arrived in port at 5:30 last evening from Masset Inlet points and sailed at 8 p.m. for Vancouver and waypoints.


