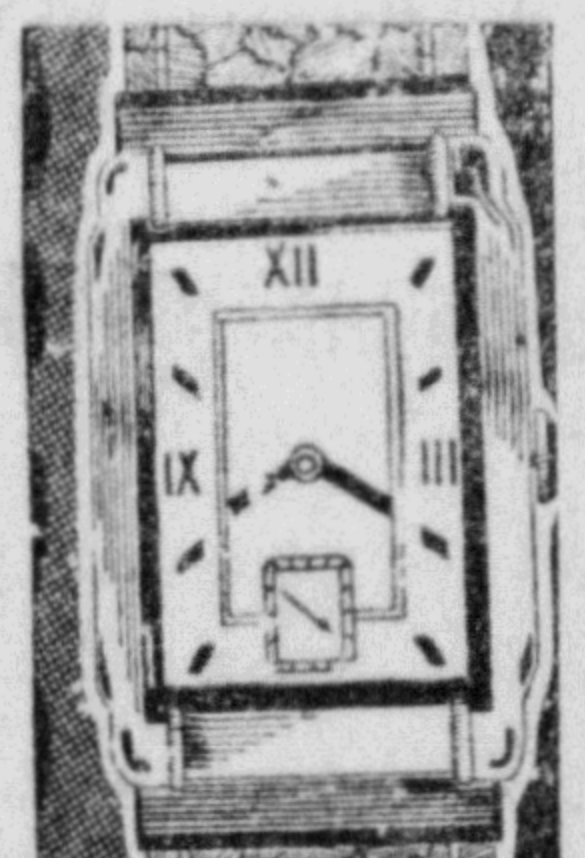

NATIVE BASKETBALL— Kitkatla and Port Simpson in Finals

Kitkatla and Port Simpson moved into the championship finals of the annual native basketball tournament by virtue of their wins last night at the Civic Centre. Kitimat and Bella Bella won their consolation round games to gain play-off berths tonight for the consolation trophy. Port Essington, Metlakatla, Thunderbirds and Brotherhood were all knocked out of further tournament play.

Tonight is the big night of the series and two close contests are assured with Bella Bella and Kitimat slated for the opening game and Port Simpson and Kitkatla for the final. After the games the Native Basketball Association is having a dance in the Civic Centre auditorium.

**Metlakatla 46
Kitkatla 65**
Kitkatla started out fast to run up 11 points before Metlakatla was able to score a basket. Metlakatla was never able to overcome the early lead as Kitkatla outpointed them in each period except the final. Metlakatla came up well in the fourth period but their scoring spree was too late, as Kitkatla was too far in the lead. Kitkatla held a 26-point lead in the early part of the last quarter which the Metlakatlas whittled down to 19 before the game was over with Kitkatla on top, 65 to 46.

Innes of the winners played one of the best individual games of the tournament as he scored 14 on some very smart ball handling. Robinson, with 12, Tolmie, 11, and Vickers, 10, all played excellent ball. For the losers Leask was high with 10 but he didn't take advantage of his superior height to get in for the all-important rebounds.

**Port Simpson 70
Thunderbirds 45**
Port Simpson won a place in the championship finals with a 70-45 victory over the Thunderbirds who gave them quite a scare in the first half as they scored basket for basket until Simpson finally overtook them at 15-13. From there on the Simpson team pulled steadily ahead to lead 31 to 21 at the end of the half and to outscore 39 to 24 in the final period.

Vern Dudoward of Thunderbirds turned in a fine performance as he scored 27 points for the losers.

High men for the winning team were Sankey with 17, Rice with 15 and McKay with 10. Tait scored 13 for the losers.

The game was a little rough and Referees Davidson and Gurvich called 12 fouls on the losers and 18 on the winner.

Port Simpson will meet Kitkatla in the final game tonight.

**Bella Bella 63
Port Essington 15**
Bella Bella walked all over Port Essington to earn a place in the consolation finals by a 63 to 15 win. Peers for Bella Bella scored 35 points, 23 of them in the final half. Spalding was high for Essington as he scored nine on three fields shots and three free throws. Referees Davidson and Slatta had an easy time of it as the game was cleanly played with only five fouls called on the losers and six on the winners. Bella Bella is a greatly improved team over last year and should give Kitimat a real battle for the consolation trophy tonight.

**Kitimat 43
Brotherhood 26**
Kitimat came through with an easy win to gain their place in the consolation finals tonight, trimming the hastily-picked Brotherhood entry by a 43 to 26 margin.

Chris Wilson and J. Robinson again proved themselves to be the two strong men of the winning team and led in the scoring with Wilson getting 28 and Robinson 10.

For the losers, Cooper and Walker were the only players who could find the hoop as they scored 12 and eight, respectively. The clean play of both these teams is worthy of mention as Kitimat had only one foul called in the whole game, and the losers had six. It was an easy

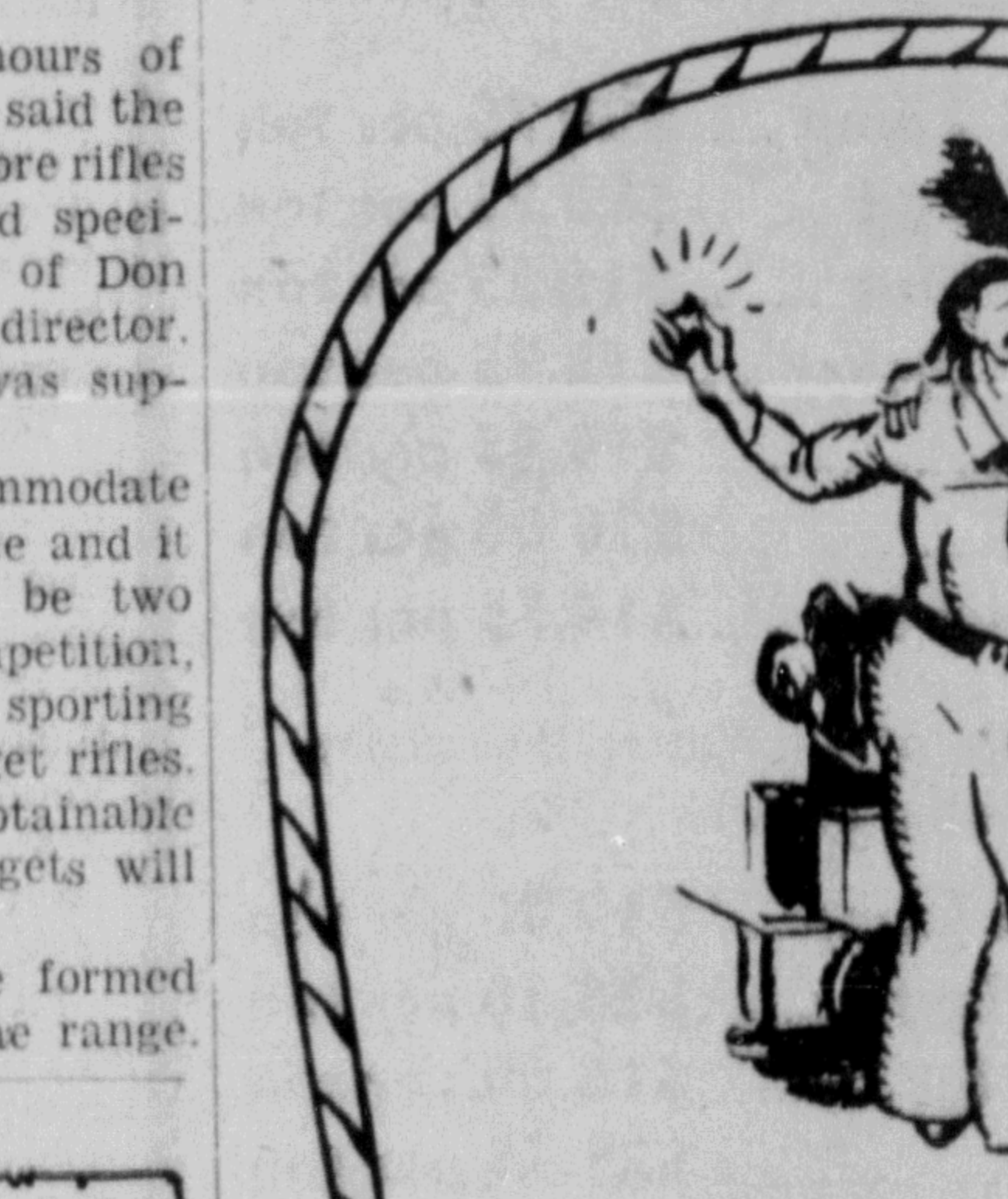
