After Drive

Probably the first car to make it over the highway from Prince George to Prince Rupert this year came in to the city over the week-end.

"After punching the road between here and Terrace, I ran into an icy stretch just this side of Galloway Rapids bridge and slid into a rock bank," says John Walker, driver of the car.

Mr. Walker, a salesman, has travelled from the Fraser Valley to Prince Rupert by road With snow recorded over six feet deep between here and Terrace, the highway has been officially closed since December.

Driving a modern Ford sedan, loaded with samples and using nobby tires, Walker "just made it under the line," said the department of public works here. They explained that the road might have been open for bare 20 minutes in some places before it filled over with snow.

Expressing regret that, after having come so far without mishap, he should have suffered over \$100 damage when almost in Prince Rupert, Mr. Walker filed accident papers at the city detachment of the RCMP yesterday.

Although the car can still be driven, it is knocked out of line by a severe blow to the right front fender and frame. driver said.

But Mr. Walker and his wife, who travelled with him, said that they are pleased to be back in Prince Rupert.

"It was 10 years ago since I was here last—and by just looking at the Daily News and other Prince Rupert business, I can see a lot of changes—almost unbelievable in 10 years' time,' said the traveller.
