possible only by use of the most modern and efficient machines and procedures. Only the most skilled and highly trained workmen can be used who are in great demand and command higher than average rates of pay.

REFORESTATION

In reforestation, natural seeding is most successful and most economical. This method is used by Columbia Cellulose in its operations near Prince Rupert and Terrace. This is done by leaving uncut mature timber adjacent to the cutover lands, from which seeds will be scattered by the wind in the fall, to reappear as seedlings in the following spring.

By seeding in new forests to replace the timber removed, a continued supply of growing trees is assured. Although the new crops needs 60 to 100 years to grow, the existing forest is large enough to provide timber from the old growth while new timber matures.

By far the greatest enemy to forests is fire and man can be justly charged with being the worst offender. A carelessly thrown cigarette or lighted match, sparks from engine exhausts, trash fires, sparks from mill smokestacks or waste burners, friction of a cable running over a dry fallen log, have in the past destroyed untold wealth in burning timber.

FIRE

In protection from fire, most important step is to stop fires which are burning and the government Forest Service and loggers use every resource at man's command in fighting this enemy.

Second most important measure in forest protection is education and publicity. Although the people of British Columbia live on the very edge of the forest, few realize the importance of forests to their own personal economy. This publicity, therefore, is directed to man's self-interest as well as to his civic responsibility.

ered by shoals and rocks, finally came to anchor off the bombed headquarters of the South Koreans. It was bright moonlight. The village was still burning furiously, as if the towering volcanic mountain behind it had erupted and poured burning lava down its slopes.

To the north could be seen the island recently occupied by the enemy, sprawled across the horizon ominously dark and silent.

Commander King and his staff officers had a hurried consultation with the apprehensive shore commander and learned the positions of enemy camps and their small boat anchorages. The ship promptly moved to a more advantageous position and announced her presence with her 4-inch guns.

As somebody said, "Just to let everybody in the area know that the navy has arrived and there's going to be no more nonsense."

The destroyer stood by the threatened island for six days. With each new intelligence report she would manoeuvre in to bombard.

NEW TASK

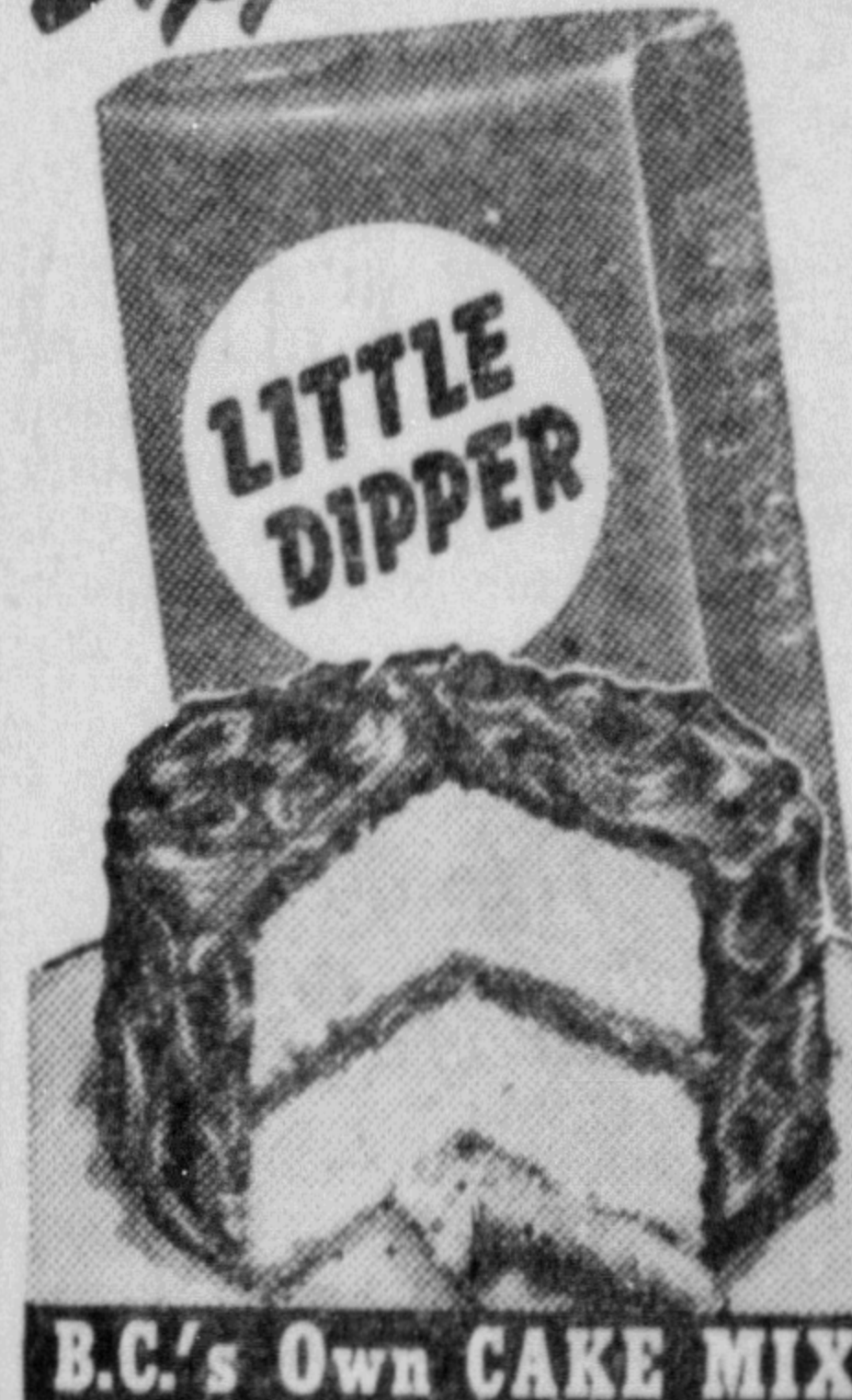
On the last night, the task was a new one. This time the Athabaskan was to embark 47 wounded South Koreans for removal to the southward for medical treatment. During this operation HMCS Cayuga, (Commander James Plomer, of Saint John and Victoria) joined to stand guard while Athabaskan took the wounded on board.

The ship's medical officer, Surgeon Lieut. C. A. West of Toronto, and his medical assistant, Petty Officer M. B. Laviole of Victoria, had to prepare facilities for the passengers during the 18 hour trip to the south. Four seamen and stewards were hurriedly turned into medical assistants to help out—Ldg. Sea, R. H. Jupp of Victoria, Ldg. Sea, G. J. Brown of Toronto and AB S. J. Beech of Toronto. This team worked 24-hour shifts to prepare accommodation for the wounded and, when they arrived, to make them as comfortable as possible.

Although living quarters in a destroyer in war service are crowded at the best of times, the seamen willingly evacuated most of their messdecks to make room for the wounded. They even entertained the suffering Koreans with songs and by the time the ship reached Inchon, the Canadian sailors and their guests had worked up a few hymns in international four-part harmony.

After this six-day operation, it turned out to be something of a relief for the Athabaskan's crew to get back to the mundane job of carrier screening. It meant a return to regular watchkeeping duty, with expectation of a reasonable amount of rest. While they had been on inshore prow, every night had been spent continuously at action stations, with maybe a couple of hours fitful sleep in the shelter of a gun turret. The hammocks seemed truly luxurious after that.

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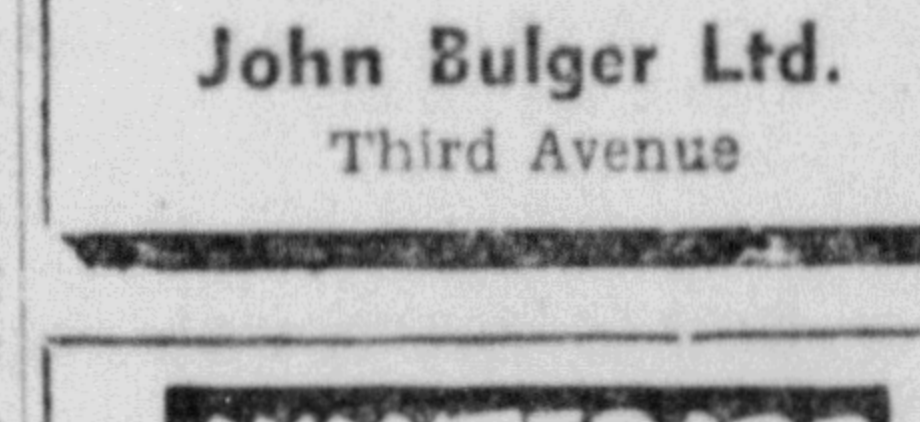
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
