Mystery Plane Over Telkwa

Telkwa—Telkwa and vicinity was treated to a fine display of antics when a large plane streaked out of the sky from the east leaving a trail of vapor behind. When first sighted the plane itself could not be seen with the naked eye, cruising at 30,000 feet altitude. Conjecture ran high; some thought it a jet plane, others a rocket. All that could be seen was the exhaust billowing out to mark the direction in which the missile was taking. Later in a series of criss-crossings the plane flew lower and could be observed, but the trails of vapor were stationary for some 30 to 40 minutes, making an unusual pattern of lines in the sky. After 45 minutes of swerving through the heavens it streaked out in an easterly direction from whence it came.

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Terrace Wants Plane Landing

TERRACE — The Board of Trade at its regular monthly meeting last week decided to write to Mr. E. T. Applewhite urging that a wharf and float be installed at Lakelse Lake as there has been, during the past months a considerable volume of air-plane traffic but not as much as there would have been had there been landing facilities.

The meeting was not well attended, chairmen of committees being conspicuous by their absence. Mr. Alec Gillanders, president, was in the chair.

Will Robinson, reporting for the Highway committee, gave a summary of his talk with Hon. E. C. Carson. He stated work on the Remo road had gone ahead on the south side of the river, working out from Remo towards town and it is to be a standard highway connecting Terrace and Remo west of the airport. The Remo ferry will then be eliminated. The re-routing of the highway to Copper City and Usk, north of the Skeena River, is also under consideration and when implemented, will eliminate the ferries at both points. The Minister visited Deep Creek with James Smith and the damage of the road at that point was fully recognized by him. On his return to Victoria, Mr. Carson said the matter was to be investigated and the Board advised of the action to be taken.
