Blackwood on Bridge

This hand came along at an opportune time. Mr. Masters had just been talking to Mr. New, the kibitzer, about trump management. He pointed out that there are three basic types of hands that declarer has to deal with.

On one you lead out all of the opponents' trumps as soon as you gain the lead. On the second, you defer leading trumps until the trump cards in dummy have been used to ruff out your losers.

And on the third type, you never lead trumps at all. This last situation came up in the deal shown today.

It was Mrs. Keen's opening lead and she figured from the bidding that the hand might be a cross-ruff. So she cleverly led a trump to stop it if possible. This lead saved her a trick and in fact if she or Mr. Champion had held one quick entry, a second trump lead would have been fatal to Mr. Masters' contract. But the defender never got the lead again until 10 tricks

had been racked up—and you may be sure Mr. Masters himself didn't lead a second round of trumps. He won the first trick in his own hand and counted up his winners.

He only needed nine more. Outside of hearts, there were three sure winners—the aces of spades, diamonds and clubs. That meant six tricks had to be won in the trump suit itself.

At this point there were just six trumps in Mr. Masters' hand and the dummy. So each and every one of them had to win a trick separately.

Mr. Masters first cashed his ace of spades. Incidentally, this procedure is a very important part of the cross-ruff technique. Always cash your quick side winners first. Otherwise an opponent may sluff completely out of one of your side suits while you are cross-ruffing—and thus be able to trump the first lead of that suit when you finally get around to making it.

After taking the ace of spades Mr. Masters played his ace of clubs and ruffed a club. Then he cashed dummy's ace of diamonds and ruffed a small diamond in his hand. And so back and forth, trumping clubs and diamonds, until each of his trumps had won a trick. Total—seven trump tricks and three side aces or 10 tricks in all.

GARDEN HINTS

One expert says garden crops which are eaten raw should not be harvested more than ten minutes before using; others not more than half an hour. Try to come as near to this as possible.

Do not wait until insects damage your crops before you begin to fight them. You can prevent the damage if you begin in time.

Second sowings grow faster than first, because the weather is warmer; so due allowance should be made to prevent the harvest of both overlapping too much.

Many sorts of mulches may be used between rows in the garden, to keep weeds down and moisture in. Old newspapers serve well, and lawn clippings are good.

Research Has Outmoded Hard Work of Deep Cultivation. An Inch or Two is Deep Enough.

As soon as seedling plants show in the garden row, cultivation should begin; and if it is not to do more harm than good, the cultivator should take it easy.

The old idea that the deeper you stirred the soil, the better, has been cast aside, completely. To cultivate in the modern manner you first sharpen the hoe blade, for it is to be considered as a cutting tool.

Draw the sharp hoe blade toward you so the top half-inch of the soil is sliced off. This will uproot or cut of all weeds which may have started, and get under the crust which may be forming in the soil. It will not disturb the plant roots, or stir the soil deep enough to cause the top layer to dry out.

Keep far away enough from the plant row so that none of the seedlings is injured, yet close enough to kill all the weeds that can be reached safely. This is not hard work, and should be done frequently enough to prevent weeds from reaching any size, and to keep the soil surface porous, so air can reach the plant roots.

Heavy soils are easily compacted, and form crusts quickly when the sun beats down.

The old fashioned goose-neck hoe is a most satisfactory tool for all cultivating tasks. If you need a hand cultivator, to use in the vegetable row or in small corners where a big hoe cannot function, then a putty knife makes a good one, if you cannot get a better.

Cultivate after every rain, when the soil has dried out enough to crumble. Begin cultivating as soon as your crops appear above the surface, and there is no reason why a weed should ever grow in your garden which requires to be pulled by hand. Ex-

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mulch of fescue grasses. But Dock accommodation, including a mulch, frequent shallow cultivation is necessary, especially after every rain.
