Dodgers No "Bums"

NEW YORK — It looks like the time has come to stop calling the Brooklyn Dodgers "dem bums."

The Dodgers yesterday rang up their sixth National League victory in a row, again humbling the St. Louis Cardinals 2 to 1 to take a six and a half game lead in the league.

That six in a row feat was matched by the amazing Chicago White Sox who blanked the Washington Senators 5 to 0 to widen their American League first place margin over the New York Yankees to five games.

Cincinnati's surging Reds moved into a second place tie in the National League with the Red Birds by edging the New York Giants 5 to 4.

Philadelphia's Phillies trounced Chicago to sink the Cubs into sixth place 7 to 1.

Boston Braves moved into a fourth place tie with the Giants with a 5 to 0 victory over Pittsburgh.

Big Luke Easter drove in three runs on a fifth inning homer to lead the Cleveland Indians to a 6 to 3 victory over the Philadelphia Athletics in an American League game under lights.

Don DiMaggio, hitting in his thirty-seventh consecutive game, singled home the needed runs for Boston as the Red Sox ended a five-game losing streak by downing Detroit Tigers 5 to 3 at Detroit.

New York Yankees surged from behind with two out in the ninth inning to defeat St. Louis Browns 7 to 5. It left the Bombers 4 1/2 games behind the pace-setting Chicago White Sox in the American League race. Bobby Brown drove in the tying run with a double and substitute Catcher Ralph Houk drove in the winning runs with a single.

When Scherk threw two wild ones, which brought in runs, Cornwell pulled him and stepped into the box himself for part of an inning. Larry Mathews finished hurling for G & A in two-thirds of the last inning.

Ottawa Singer Enjoys Career

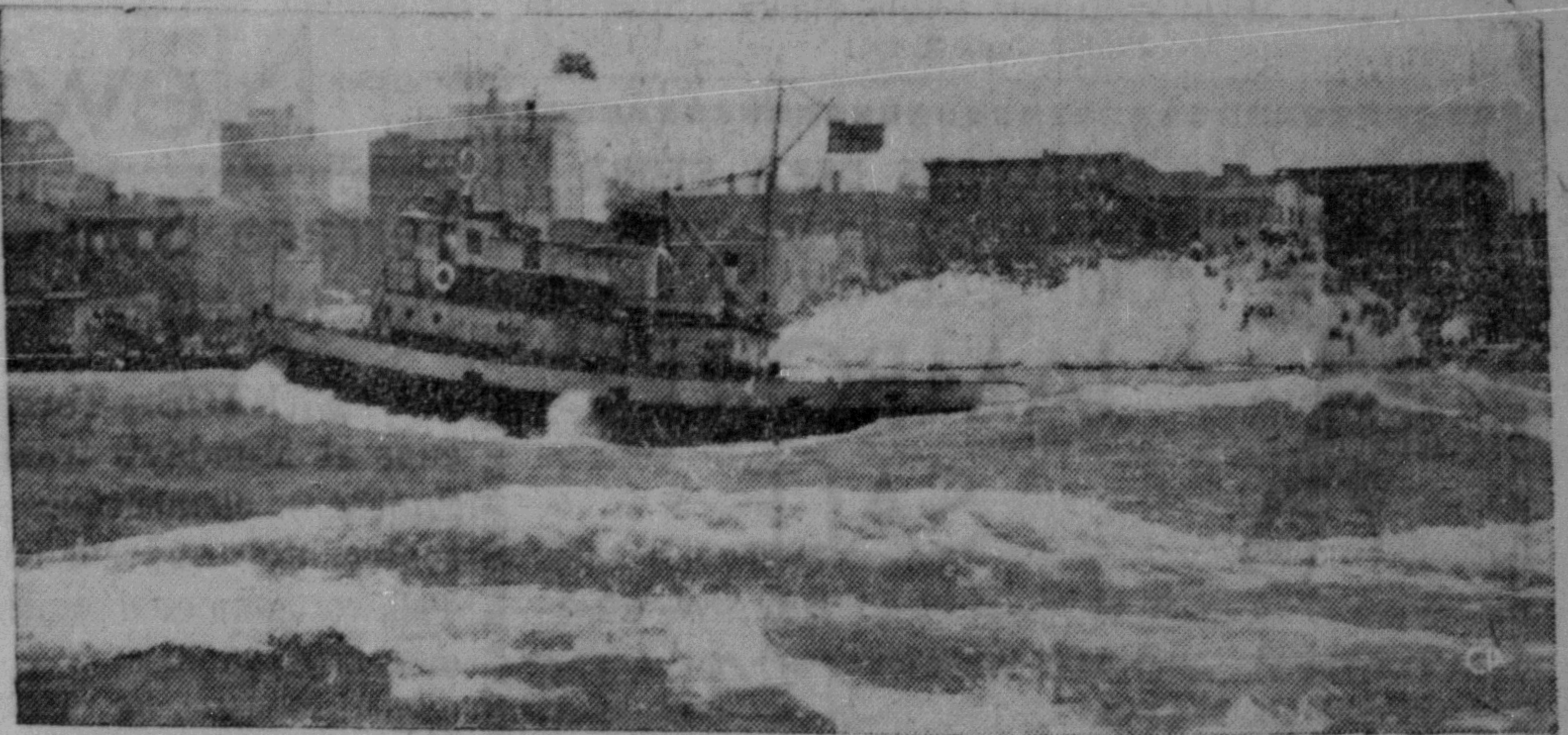
TORONTO — Although she's just 22, Marie-Helene Chevrier has done a little of everything in the theatrical line.

Princess Gets Lovely Presents

LONDON — A bouquet of Malayan and American orchids with Canadian and French roses was presented to Princess Elizabeth at the annual Flower Ball, held in conjunction with the royal opening of the Chelsea Flower Show.

Other presentations were a corsage of pink Prince Charles' orchids, a wooly lamb for Princess Anne, a toy electric stove and two dozen toy soldiers in Guards and Household Cavalry uniforms for Prince Charles.

The gifts for her children were presented to the Princess on behalf of the St. Lyses Training College for Disabled Persons, in whose aid the ball was given. More than £65 was raised for the college by the sale of flowers and seven bouquets, including one at the top price of 10 guineas, went to Elizabeth's table.

Wearing an off-shoulder gown of gold brocade, a diamond and ruby necklace, bracelet and earrings, the Princess danced for nearly three hours with the men at her table.

Longest dance of the evening went to her childhood playmate and cousin, Lord Carnegie.

"We grew up together but this is the first time for 11 years that we have danced together," said Lord Carnegie.

British Engine Story Filmed

The picture story of the making of diesel and steam turbine engines in England was presented to the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at luncheon yesterday by F. Harrop of Associated British Oil Engines who has been here from England for the past six months installing three new diesel generating units in the dry dock power house for the North British Columbia Power Co. In addition to the actual production of the engines, the film delineated the history of the development of these engines from the days of their conception and origin. The pictures were shown at the Capitol Theatre, made available by Manager Harry Black, and were projected by Sgt. L. A. N. Potterton, Rotary President. A. B. Brown was in the chair and thanked Mr. Harrop and Mr. Black.

Mr. Harrop has now about completed the installation of three new 808-kilowatt diesel units at the dry dock. Considerable changes were necessitated in the dry dock power house plant including the erection of concrete bases for each measuring 13 by 23 by 8 feet depth.

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SPORT SHOTS

Skiing has been booming in the southern Dominions since the war. In New Zealand progress has been particularly rapid and it now has considerably more ski tows, than Australia. New Zealand has higher mountains and much more varied terrain than its larger neighbor and the installation of tows by private companies, the government and many clubs has resulted in a rapid improvement in the standard.

There is no doubt, however, that the standard in Canada is still much higher and facilities infinitely better. No resort in the southern Dominions, for instance, has anything more advanced than simple rope tows.

Ice skating, which figures on the Olympic program, is merely an outdoor sport practised on frozen lakes in the south in New Zealand, but there are one or two indoor rinks in Australia. Chief competition in this and in ice hockey would have to come from Great Britain, as the southern standard does not approach that of Canada.

Curling, however, is extensively played on the southern lakes of New Zealand. Introduction of an Empire Winter Games would undoubtedly give all these sports a great boost in Australia and New Zealand.

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
