Clarifying

President Truman Says Fighting to Continue-Rebukes News Gatherers.

KEY WEST, Florida-Fighting will continue in Korea as long at there is danger of the United Nations being caught off balance in a peace trap. President Truman said here yesterday in a press conference at which the confusing situation arising out of the "false truce" was discuss-

The President, incidentally, gave an off the cuff rebuke to news gathering agencies for disseminating "false" cease fire stories. He attributed the stories to intense competition for news but suggested that serious broad possibilities arising from false reports should be considered more important than mere competition for news. He urged the news gatherers to adhere strictly to the truth in these serious

Meantime, in spite of official statements to the contrary, the Press Association in New York insisted that there had been orders issued to stop ground fight-

Latest explanation of the truce order stories Wednesday is that a directive issued by General Van Fleet had been misinterpreted before there had been time to clarify it. The original order had said that an agreement had the cease fire line but that other Bert Jefferies, chairman of points had to be settled. Suggestion was made that there should be no ground offensive merely to capture ground that might have to be given back
