Finely RECIPES

SALMON CURRY AU GRATIN
1 lb. can of salmon
1 cup rice
3 tbs. butter
2 tbs. flour
1 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. dry mustard
1/2 tsp. curry powder
1 1/2 cups milk
1/4 lb. sharp cheese, grated

Wash the rice and cook in rapidly boiling salted water for 15 minutes. Drain and wash off excess starch. Melt the butter and stir in the flour and seasonings; add the milk, the liquid and oil from the salmon, and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Grate the cheese and save out 3 tbs. for the top; combine the rest with the sauce, rice, and the salmon (flaked). Turn into a medium sized oiled casserole and sprinkle the remaining cheese on the top. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) about 45 minutes. 6 to 8 servings.

Library Had Active Year

Increased Circulation and Membership Reported

Despite illness of the librarian and changes during the past year, the circulation did not suffer but in fact showed a substantial increase, according to the librarian's report at the annual meeting of Prince Rupert Library Board. Total circulation in 1949 was 17,892 while in 1950 it rose to 19,303—an increase of 1,501.

Registration figures showed a decrease for the year, 321 in 1951 against 336 in 1949 but, as the cancellations in 1949 were much higher, at the end of 1950 there was a net gain in borrowers of 144—there being 1,568 in 1949 and 1,712 in 1950.

The young people's section, started in 1948, is proving very popular and had a most successful year, circulation jumping from 1,100 in 1949 to 1,616 in 1950, an increase of about 50 percent. With the young people showing such a gratifying interest in the books at their disposal, the librarian brought to the Board's attention the need for funds to build up this section.
