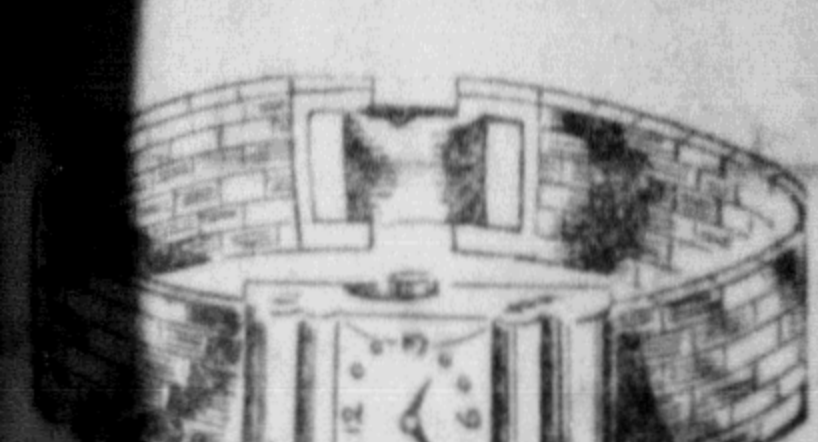

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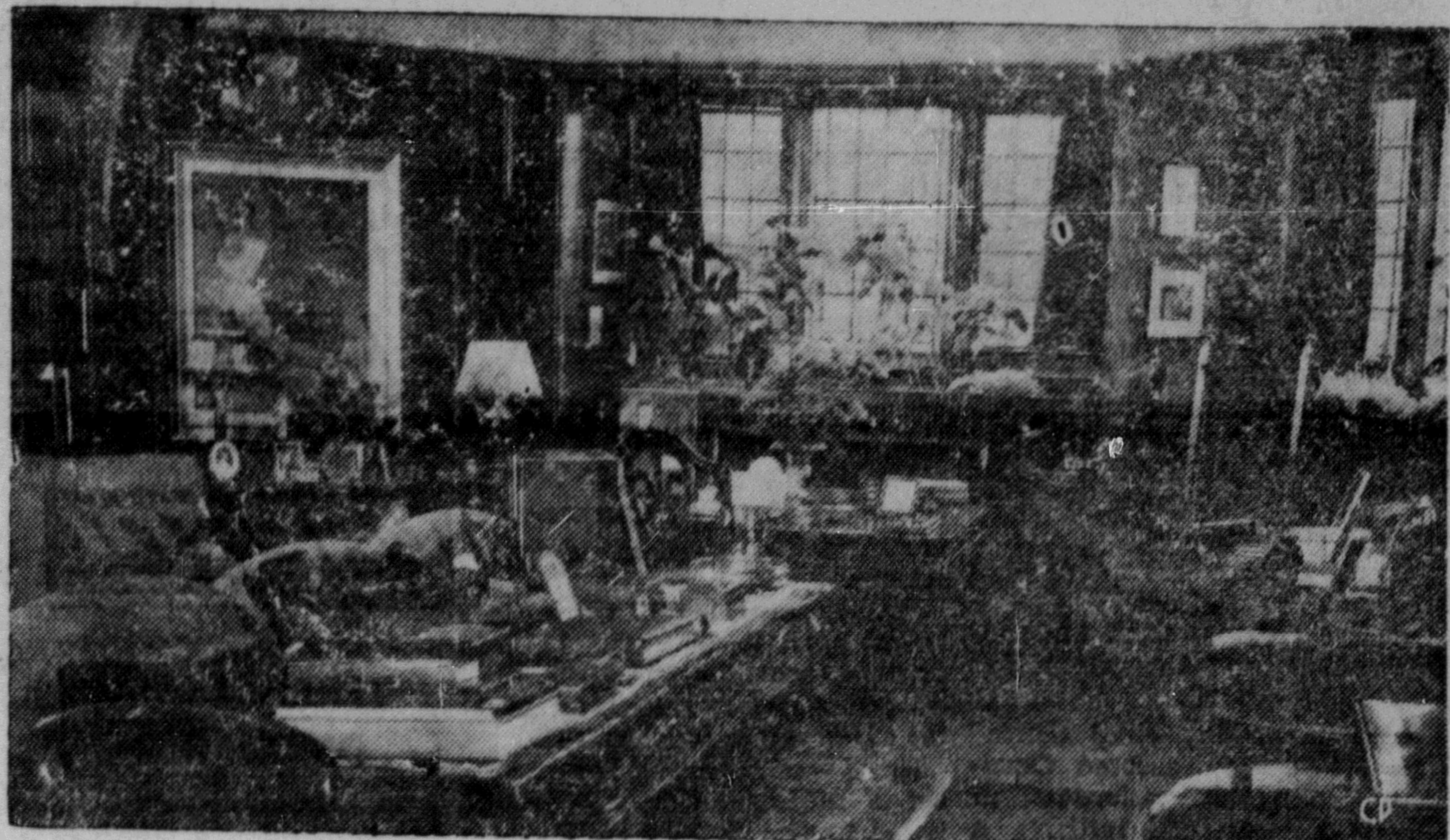

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## Blackwood on Bridge

By Easley Blackwood

Remember this important point: After your partner has responded to your four no-trump bid telling how many aces he has, do not bid five no-trump to ask him for kings unless you and he hold all of the aces. The reason is obvious. When you bid five no-trump you are automatically forcing the bidding into the six range.

The five no-trump bid is used only for deciding whether or not to bid a grand slam. And nobody wants to bid a grand slam if the opponents hold an ace.

The player who bids four no-trump is captain of the hand. He hears his partner's response showing aces and then it is up to him alone to decide whether to bid a small slam. However, when the same player follows up with a bid of five no-trump, there is no captain of the hand. Now, both players know the side has all the aces and either player may decide to play for a grand slam if his holding warrants it.

In the deal shown, after Mr. Champion found out that Mr. Masters had two aces he still didn't feel that he himself could bid seven. But he could make a bid that might enable Mr. Masters to bid the grand slam. He could tell his partner that the partnership had all the aces. His five no-trump bid did just that.

Usually Mr. Masters would have made the normal response of six hearts showing two kings. But on this particular hand he decided to skip the response entirely. He knew he was off no

aces. He knew he himself had second and third round control of trumps. He knew he had a solid diamond suit. And he knew Mr. Champion suspected a grand slam (else he would have skipped the five no-trump bid and gone directly to six spades).

So Mr. Masters figured the grand slam was better than a two-to-one shot and therefore a good bid. The hand was a spread for 13 tricks.

## Margin Set On Oil Off

VICTORIA—The Provincial Government has decided to eliminate a set margin of profit for distributors in the sale of gasoline thus taking another step in removing controls from the petroleum industry. The only control the Government intends to maintain is on the number of outlets for sale of car "products."

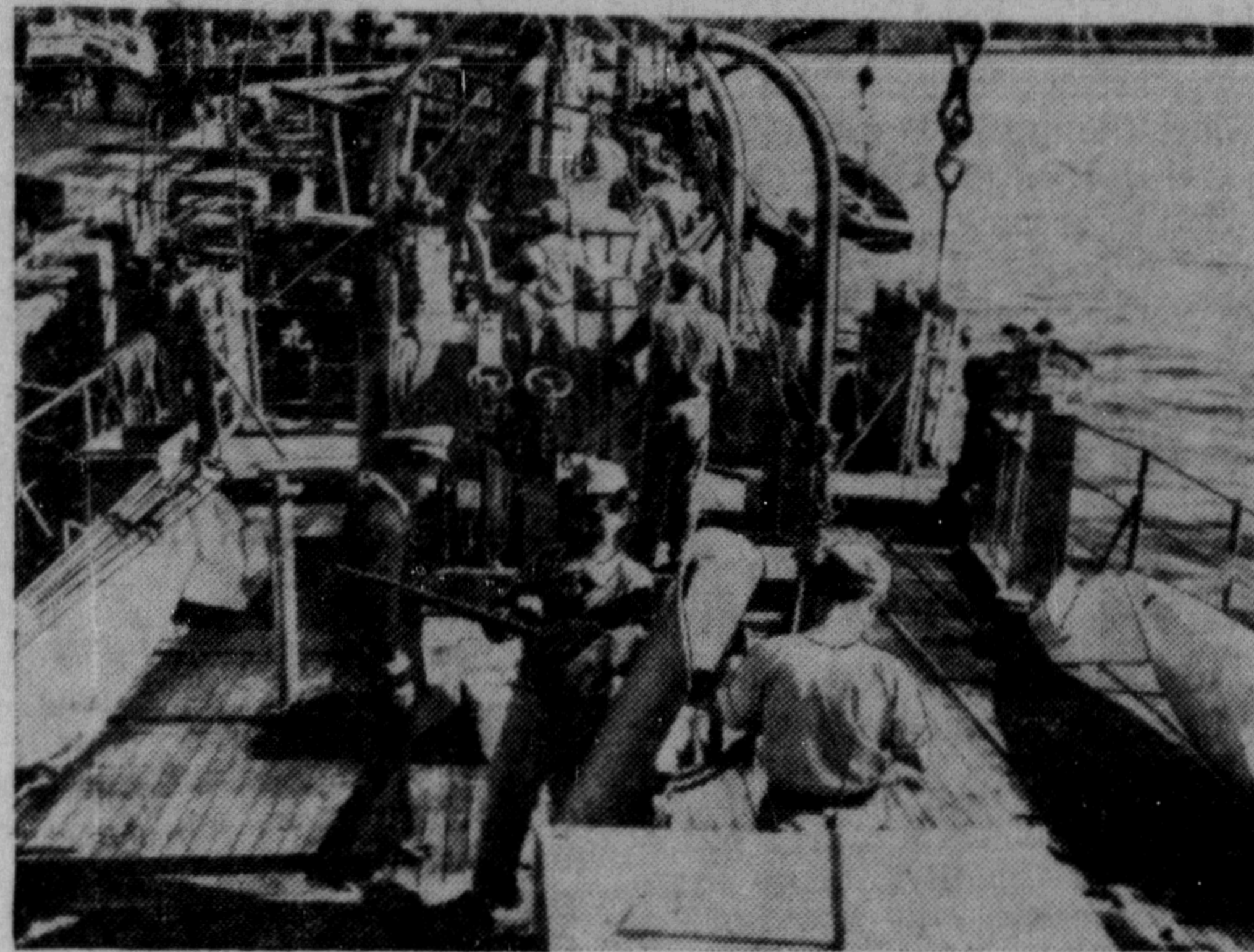
## Alberta Oil Can Compete

EDMONTON—Northern Alberta's vast oil sands could provide oil cheaply enough to compete at eastern markets with world prices on oil from normal fields, oil expert Sidney M. Blair has predicted. On a basis of a 20,000-barrel-a-day extraction plant north of Edmonton a blend of oil, gasoline and gas distillate could be pumped into Superior Wis. at \$3.50 a barrel providing 40 cents a barrel profit. Profits would yield the 5% or 6% on a \$45-million plant capital outlay and also amortize the \$5 millions required for an eight-inch pipeline from the Athabasca oil sands to Edmonton.
