THE EXPERTS Say...

HOGMANAY—Hogmanay they call it in Scotland—the last day of the year and the one which marks the beginning of New Year holiday festivities.

There will be all kinds of sweets on the family sideboards, including candy and cakes. And the shortbread—a must in every Scottish household—will be piled high on plates.

Here is the favorite shortbread recipe of a southwestern Ontario housewife. But no doubt it originally came from Scotland.

Ingredients: One-quarter cup shortening; three-quarters cup butter; three-quarters cup brown sugar; 2 1/2 cups flour; pinch of salt.

Roll into balls, with a dint in middle. Before baking put a piece of maraschino cherry into each dint.

Here is another sideboard delicacy to get 1952 off to a perky start. Oatmeal crispy squares—Ingredients: One-half cup of butter; one cup brown sugar; two cups rolled oats; one teaspoon baking powder; one-half teaspoon vanilla.

Blend thoroughly together, put in greased pan, pack well. Bake 10 to 15 minutes (until golden brown). Cut in squares while hot.

REFRESHING SALAD

After nearly two weeks of nothing but rich holiday foods house guests may welcome a plain supper—particularly if it includes same kind of salad.

Cranberry and orange salad not only is a seasonal dish but also an attractive one.

Put one full cup cranberries and one large orange through meat grinder. Add one cup of sugar and let stand 1 1/2 hours. Dissolve one package of lemon jelly in one cup boiling water with one tablespoon vinegar. Stir in cranberry and orange mixture and put into refrigerator to set.

To serve, cut in squares on lettuce leaf.

The Canadian Association of Consumers has released a recipe for chicken scrapple—an excellent way to use up the remains of that holiday chicken or turkey.

Ingredients: 3 1/2 cups chicken broth; one tablespoon all-purpose flour; one cup corn meal; one-half teaspoon salt (one teaspoon if broth has not been salted); one-quarter teaspoon poultry seasoning; two cups of ground chicken (or turkey). Heat half the broth in double

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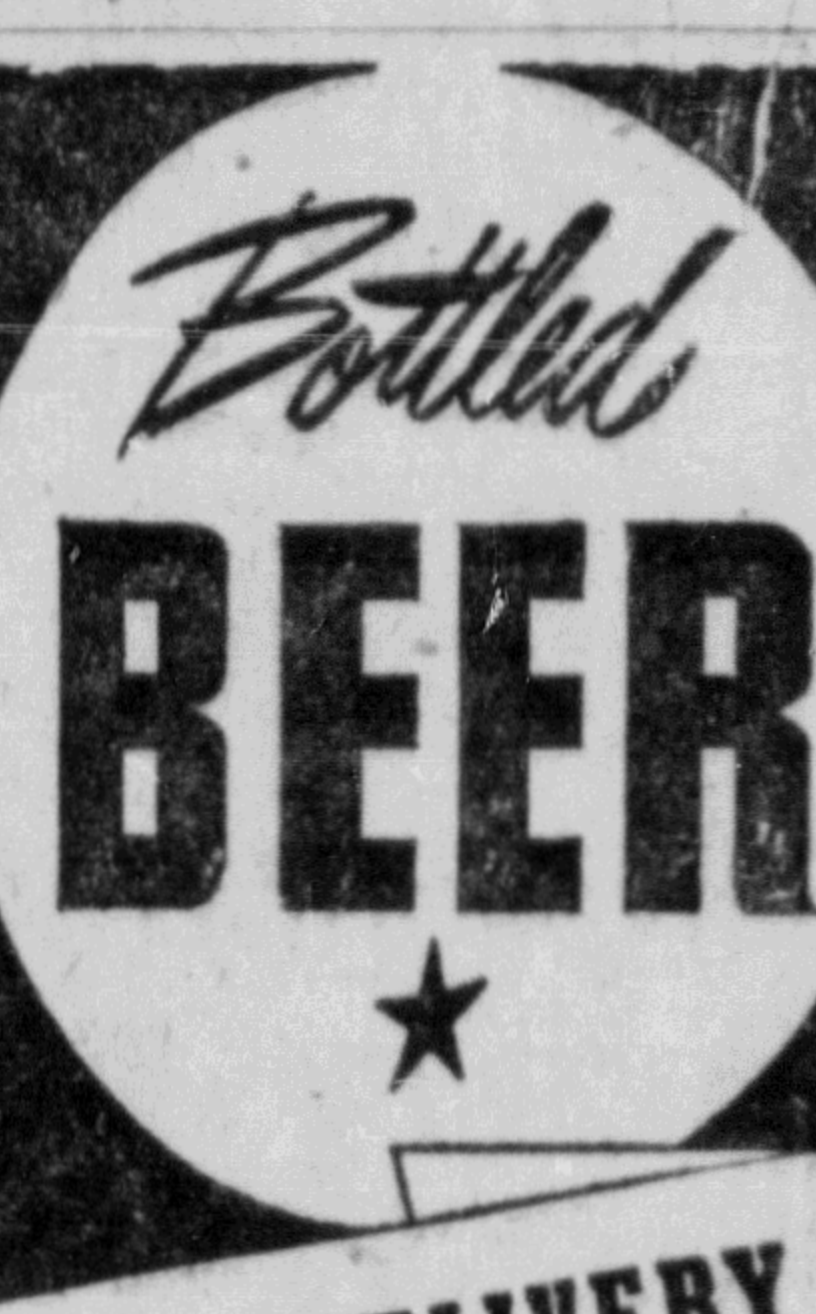
