Casualties

Enemy Losses Far Outnumber Those of United Nations

WASHINGTON, D.C. (P) — The United States Army estimated today that enemy forces in Korea had suffered 813.873 casualties through to this Wednesday.

A spokesman said this total had been broken down to 504,835 North Korean Red casualties and 291,895 Chinese Communists plus 17,143 not yet distinguished between Chinese and Korean.

The total includes 145,145 enemy soldiers taken prisoner.

Overall United Nations casualty figures for the Korean campaign are not immediately avail-

Life as Tree Falls on Cabin

TERRACE—Painful although not serious injuries were sustained by William Gagne, 28, early on Wednesday morning in a miraculous escape from death when a tree crashed onto his cabin in a terrific gale which roared throughout the district during the night, doing considerable damage and blocking the roads with fallen trees.

Employed by Jimmy O'Brien in logging operations near Williams Creek on the Lakelse Road, the injured man was sleeping in the cabin when he was awakened at 3:30 a.m. by the noise of the wind and the crack of a breaking tree. He got out of bed and was preparing to leave the cabin when a large cottonwood tree crashed on to it and the bed was crushed.

Gagne was pinned under one of the roof beams but managed to crawl out and lay, waiting for help during the long, cold night. He was found about 10 a.m. by Jim O'Brien who sought help from the Fraborne Mill crew and the man was taken by stretcher to the mill about two miles away.

Doctor Stanley Mills was called to the scene and the injured man was attended to and sent into town by ambulance.

He is now in the Outpost Hospital where he is suffering from bruises and chill due to exposure.
