Bob Feller Wins 19th

Cleveland Indians Boost Lead To 2½ Games as Yankees Continue Slump

NEW YORK (CP) — Cleveland fans honored Bob Feller Monday night and the veteran right-hander pitched the red hot Indians to a victory over Detroit Tigers.

The victory was Feller's nineteenth of the year, the Indians' eleventh and it enabled the hustling Tribe to increase their lead in the American League pennant race to two-and-a-half games over the New York Yankees who went to pieces in Philadelphia, suffering a 18 to 8 defeat at the hands of the Athletics.

BATTER UP

There comes a day of reckoning for everyone, they say, and this is it for Prince Rupert baseball players at least, as far as their hitting power is concerned.

To settle one argument in advance quickly, we will explain here that the Baseball Association lost a score book containing the scores of three games played by each team, so the averages, instead of covering all 12 games, are based only on the nine games played by each team—beginning June 19.

Of course, the breaks of the game as well as the number of trips to the plate have a lot to do with the above averages. For example, Cornwell, on top with 400, had 30 times at bat, hitting 12 times.

Pavlikis had 38 tries—the most of any batter since June 19—and was responsible for 15 hits, while Clecone was in the batter's box only seven times with two hits, bringing his average over the 200 mark.

But baseball isn't nearly ended here—unless the weatherman puts a crimp in it—and most players will have a good opportunity to raise their averages.

Along the sports grapevine we hear that a good prize is in the offing for this year's series champions, and also that a private citizen is going to make it his business to make an award to the league's top hitter.

Now, as far as pitching strength is concerned, we find Dick "Richie Boy" Letourneau on top with four wins and no losses, (also since June 19).

NATIONAL LEAGUE

That was the only action in the American League but the National League had a full card.

The league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers downed the Boston Braves 7 to 6. The runner-up New York Giants turned back the Philadelphia Phillies 5 to 2. The Cincinnati Reds won a double-header from Pittsburgh Pirates 2-0 and 7-1 and the Chicago Cubs defeated the St. Louis Cardinals 6 to 3.

A crowd of 46,290 paid customers turned out to honor Feller at Cleveland's Municipal Stadium.

Airship Vets Organizing

LONDON (CP)—Men who used to fly Britain's airships have formed an organization known as the "Guild of Airshipmen."

Officials associated with the building of the great Zeppelin sent a letter of good wishes to the organization's first annual dinner. Among those attending were some crew members of the British airship R-100 which made its first important flight in July, 1936, from Cardington, Bedfordshire, to Montreal in 79 hours and returning in 57 hours.

Work on lighter-than-air craft was suspended the same year when the R-101 crashed in Beauvais, France, killing 46 persons.

Death of W. R. Hearst

BEVERLY HILLS, Cal. (CP)—Publisher William Randolph Hearst, aged 88, died today.

Death came only a day after the builder of a newspaper empire sank into a coma. Hearst had been in ill health for many years but still kept up an active interest in his many newspapers.

Present at the end were his son, William Randolph Hearst, jr., George, John, David and Randolph Hearst.

Ben Hogan Is Winner

CHICAGO (CP)—Ben Hogan slammed a pair of 33's for 65 Sunday to win golf's biggest purse of \$12,500. Hogan shot a 15 under par 273 in the Tam O'Shanter "world" championship.

Jimmy Demarest of Ojai, California, leader by five strokes on entering the last round, finished second with 276 to collect \$5000.

Pete Cooper, from White Plains, New York, banged a final 69 while Bobby Locke of South Africa added seventy each to finish at 277 and win \$2750.

Stan Leonard, Vancouver pro, finished three strokes over par with a fourth round 75 and a 72-hole total of 291.
