Broken Wire Stops Power
Power failure yesterday at 3:45, general throughout the city, was due to broken wires and a pole. T. B. Black, manager of Northern B.C. Power Co. Ltd., said reports from a repair crew indicated high winds had blown down a dead tree from a 1000-foot height in the Ecstall River area, causing the break.
Repairs will be made by this evening in the area, 35 miles from Prince Rupert, along the Skeena River. Power from the company's auxiliary diesel plant at the drydock is supplying city power at present.

Local Girls to Visit One Of U.S. Most Historic Cities
Prince Rupert's Jobs Daughters drill team will entrain tomorrow evening for Richmond, Virginia, to take part in international competition. Also proceeding eastward will be a party of friends. All, it is expected, will be back on the coast by the end of August.
The tour will include a day in Toronto, on which occasion the girls will demonstrate their skill at the annual fair.
Richmond has a population of about 195,000. In the year 1779, then but a village, it became the state capital, remaining so ever since.
Today, Richmond is Virginia's largest community and the most important, not only from historic but also from financial, industrial and commercial standpoints. The city is also foremost as a transportation centre.
Approximately 120 miles from the national capital of Washington, it was in Richmond that the government of the Confederacy became established between 1860 and 1865, during which momentous years the American Civil War was fought.
The dwelling house occupied by Jefferson Davis, the Confederate President, still stands in Richmond, as well as many other reminders of the four years' struggle.
Capitol Square, consisting of twelve acres is in the centre of the city. Here are many notable buildings, monuments, memorials, as well as churches that, while not of architectural distinction, are linked with American history. It was in one of these that Patrick Henry made the speech, supporting the revolution against Great Britain, ending with the words "give me liberty or give me death."
The city has an auditorium in which as many as 2,500 persons can be seated. Here is the centre of the American tobacco and trade distribution centre, numerous and varied manufacturing plants, museums, academies, colleges, medical institution and theological teaching, as well as several noted libraries.
There were no fewer than fifteen separate battles fought to capture Richmond during the Civil War, most of these being directed by General U. S. Grant. It was not until the spring of 1865 that Richmond was evacuated. This was shortly after Jefferson Davis, attending service in St. Paul's Episcopal Church, was advised by one of his commanders that Richmond could be defended no longer.
