


England — A three-year-old boy who died in this Buckinghamshire town left a will, bequeathing his estate of £125 (\$375) to his mother.

Good play and good luck are a hard combination to beat. Mr. Champion needed both to bring home his contract in today's deal.

Mrs. Keen was torn between a heart lead and a club lead. She finally decided to open her fourth best heart and that was the good luck angle on the hand. It was all Mr. Champion needed. He handled the rest of it himself.

Put yourself in Mr. Champion's place as declarer. You can see that you have to lose one diamond if the finesse is wrong, one heart trick and two club tricks if the ace is back of dummy's king.

There is one further thought. If Mrs. Keen can be kept out of the lead, the danger of losing two club tricks disappears.

All right, now back to the opening heart lead. Mr. Abel played the king and what should Mr. Champion play from the closed hand? Why, the five spot, of course. This play effectively blocks out Mrs. Keen from ever obtaining the lead.

This application of the hold-up (keeping the "dangerous" opponent out of the lead) comes up often than you think. Watch for it—I guarantee it's worth the trouble.

on the way to Atlin. Before the end of April the initial crew will be at the property. The schedule calls for starting to strip high grade oxidized ore zone by bulldozer by the first week in June. Ore will be milled for shipment also from "2X" tunnel where ore worth \$102 a ton at present metal prices extends for 525 feet, averaging 2.5 ft. wide, according to Dolmage report. Mr. McDonough expects ore will start leaving for Trail Smelter via Carcross by mid-August. Later when a stockpile of shipping grade ore has been assembled it will be possible to save \$15 per ton freight charges by shipping in larger quantities to Selby, California. The low cost water haul from Skagway, Alaska, to Selby on tidewater will eliminate the rail haul from Vancouver to Trail.
