



ing and by several feet of snow. The men work with two bulldozers, live in sled-drawn moveable camps and have a jeep and truck with which to get their supplies, most of which are purchased locally at Hazelton.

Dyson began with nine men but now has seven. The toughest job he expects to find follows another 20 miles where the river narrows into a canyonfaced gorge and he can no longer follow the banks. Surveying just ahead of the construction gang, the young engineer hopes to cut through a pass which will bring him near the site of the blockade.
