

Communities, where citizens have organized to wage a battle against flies, found that widespread use of DDT and good sanitation practically eliminated the fly population.

"Using DDT alone, however, i like running on one foot-you don't get very far." Dr. Black emphasizes the

"good sanitary practice must b combined" with use of DDT. Decaying food, uncovered garbage and other fly breeding spots must be cleaned up if flies are to be prevented from breeding. Since DDT kills only adult insects and not the larvae or eggs, elimination of breeding places

"is of prime importance." Although DDT is safe, if used correctly, precautions should be observed, the health officer warns. Caution against fire is important, because of the kerosene solvent commonly found in the mixture. When spraying rooms containing food ,it and all working surfaces where food is prepared should be well covered. Oil solutions of DDT are dangerous and should be washed off

immediately if spilled on the kin. Pe's should never be sprayad since they lick their fur fre-

quently. "Now is the time to fight the fly-first by cleaning up the breeding places, then using DDT spray.






