TERRACE—The Braun's Island home of F. B. Peters was razed on Tuesday morning when fire, taking hold in the roof near the chimney, quickly spread. The house was almost burned to the ground before the arrival of the fire brigade. Mr. Peters was not home at the time and a small child ran to the neighbors for help. The house had been burning a while before the volunteer fire department could be notified. All that was saved were

a washing machine, radio and sewing machine, also a large quantity of flour. There is a small insurance.

The Peters came here from the south about six months ago and their youngest child is only about two weeks old. Older children are going to school. Neighbors gave shelter to the homeless family until other arrangements could be made.

Dies at Home Of Daughter

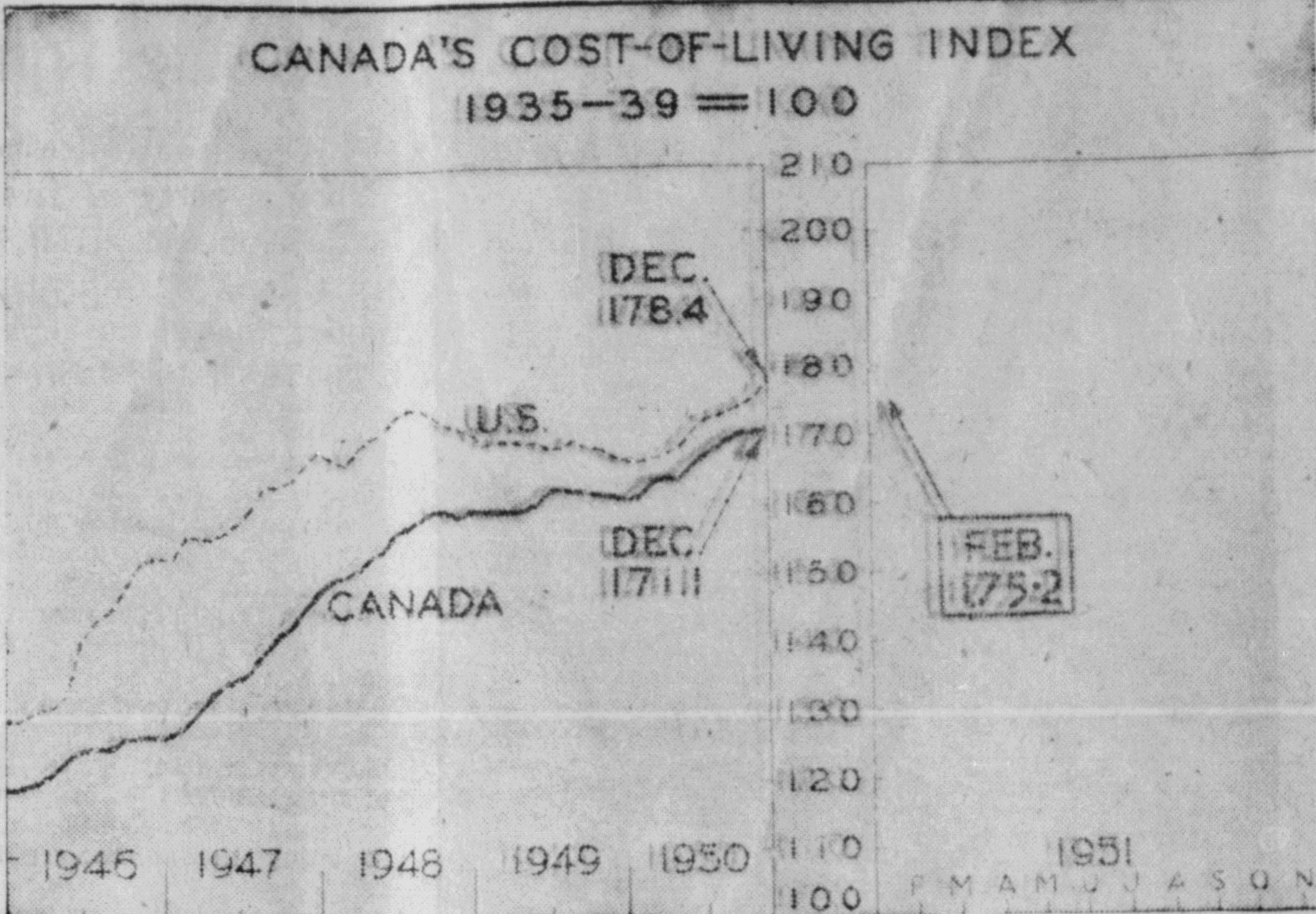
Herbert Markham Catton, 74, father of Mrs. George Philippon, died at the Philippon home, 1805 Graham Ave., yesterday morning.

C.N.R. Summer Ship Schedule

las Channel, Ocean Pass, here from Vancouver, River and Ocean Pass, sailing at 12 midnight Thursdays and Saturdays 11:15 p.m. The steamers will be on daylight time the two summer months.

Education Week

Prince Rupert Citizens Answer a Question
Interviewer—VESTA A. DOUGLAS, Conrad Street School
Are There Adequate Opportunities for Adult Education in Prince Rupert?

A HAIG—Up to the present time, yes. However, due to impending intensive logging operations in this district, it would appear that facilities for training in logging engineering should be available for our young men.

There is no doubt the woods will attract many youths and education in the methods of logging our heavy timber, together with a knowledge of the operating of the heavy machinery used by the larger operators to deliver the logs to truck or tidewater, would fit our young men for the better jobs in the woods.

Statistics show that many logging accidents occur during the first few days of employment in the bush. There is no doubt that education in the operation of heavy machinery and the hazards to be anticipated would substantially reduce the number of accidents occurring to the inexperienced.

A. G. BOAS—In comparison with other communities (southern and eastern) I would say that Prince Rupert is started on its way and it will be a while yet before it will get over its growing pains.
Some fields of adult education are now being covered but the problem that arises is not the adult who is already working but the student immediately after he graduates. What becomes of him or her?

Many other places have trade schools where the actual trade is taught by trade instructors. They teach what must be learned before entering the field. From statistics practically all employees are now demanding a pre-trained personnel in other facilities where these schools are located. This naturally encourages me to believe that our next step in Prince Rupert should be a combined vocational and commercial school which could be used also for trade training in such fields as fishing, logging, forestry and many of the feminine arts so that we could train at home our own and not have to send them elsewhere for this specialized training.

RUSS CAMERON—We have facilities but I have not inquired deeply into this field.
W. L. WOOD—I am not fully familiar with this field but I feel sure all of us could be exposed to more learning.

JEAN CAMERON—Yes. Our Civic Centre has many activities which comparatively few adults take advantage of. Then, too, there is night school.

LYDIA THOM—Prince Rupert is to be congratulated on its

adult educational program and it is to be hoped that it will continue to meet future demands for this type of education.
MRS. D. A. JOHNSTON—A good start has been made at the Civic Centre and in night school classes. A good skating rink would tend to alleviate problems.
ROY COLLINSON—No. We have the Civic Centre which is limited to members but that is only a start.
