Native Hurt In Shooting

A firing pin flew back into the eye of Jerry Guno, 25, a native who was target shooting at Arrandale, at the mouth of the Naas River, opposite Kincollith Monday. He pulled the pin from his eye, but, due to swelling, his attending physician is unable to tell whether there is sight in the eye or not. The victim is resting quietly in the city hospital.

Guno, a native of Greenville, was admitted to the Prince Rupert Hospital yesterday, coming south on the Camosun. He was shooting with a Marlin .30-30, either at seals or a stationary target, it is believed by his doctor.

Smithers Cold Snap Severe

SMITHERS—A three day cold snap in the Bulkley Valley seemed on the wane today after causing severe damage to water pipes, nerves and hopes for an early spring.

Temperatures ranged as low as 20 below, but were accompanied with biting cold winds up to 30 miles per hour velocity. The combination proved costly in fuel bills and attacked water pipes that had actually come through two other winter cold snaps with colder temperatures.

The period followed a week of extremely mild weather that led people to believe in an early spring. Thawing conditions were well advanced when new snow was laid on a layer of ice, and the bitter cold was added to the new snow.
