Delayed 3 Days**

VICTORIA.—Thursday, October 25, is the new date on which the special session of the Legislature will meet. Announcement was made Tuesday that it had been postponed for three days because of the royal visit.

Premier Johnson announced the postponement of the opening of the special session which is called to deal with old age pensions.

The session is advanced from the previously announced date because of delay in the visit of Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh.

**Moose Brass To Be
Honored At Banquet**

Recently-elected supreme governor of the Moose James R. Ballard will be honored tonight at a banquet by all members of the Moose here.

Mr. Ballard, accompanied by Mrs. Ballard and four others, arrived here today on the Prince George, enroute to the Alaska Moose Association convention in Ketchikan, October 4-7.

The new supreme governor is on the last leg of a two months' tour of the States following his election at Buffalo in August. As a feature attraction at tonight's dinner, Mr. Ballard will play transcriptions of dedication services of the House of God at Mooseheart, Illinois, last year.

The church, said Mr. Ballard today, is the only place in the world where the Protestant, the Catholic and the Jew can worship together.

"At a cost of \$1,300,000, this church represents the dream of some of the hardest working clergymen in the country."

The governor is a practising attorney-at-law in Seattle. Accompanying him, besides his wife, are W. G. Leckey, secretary of the Seattle Moose lodge and past supreme governor, and Mrs. Leckey; Dr. Arthur Moninger of Baltimore, supreme councilman, and Herman Fisher, travelling auditor of the supreme lodge.

Mr. Ballard's last visit here was in 1945, on his way to organize the Alaska Moose Association.
