By Gen. MacArthur Warns Hard Fight Still Ahead

TOKYO (CP) — United States Marines swept through abandoned Hoengson today and stabbed deeper into the heart of Red defences on the central Korean front

Communist resistance stiffened all along the Allied line. On the east-central front, Korean Reds, wearing South Korean uniforms, knifed inside Amerito hand.

Tank-led Marines of the First Division drove into Hoengsong unopposed at 2:40 p.m. after smashing Chinese Reds in a two-day battle.

They found the rubbled highway hub littered with frozen bodies of earlier Allied casualties and scores of wrecked army trucks and jeeps. Hoengsong was virtually deserted. Only a few South Koreans remainedand those had escaped the Chi-



Agreement in Connection With Alaminum Development Presented to Legislature

VICTORIA (CP) - The Aluminum Co. of Canada, if it goes ahead with its big hydro development in British Columbia, is to be protected from excessive school taxation on its investment in dams and powerhouses, it was learned in government circles yesterday.

The government will be given power to make agreements on what taxation shall be. Without this clause company officials feel it might be at the mercy from year to year of local school boards who could levy high taxes on company plants and support the entire school system in this manner.




