Harold said: "You are tearing it, you will have to replace it." Loraine then took off her sweater and she and Ryan put it on Wesley, Police had asked about it the next day, he said. Loraine had only a brassiere on the upper part of her body after she took off the sweater but was fully clothed in Fire Chief


