



had been no fighting of any kind on the boat while he was on it, he said.

Cross-examined, witness said the first time he had spoken to the police afterward he had lied about the drinking that had taken place. He had told them the truth about it several weeks ago. He had been charged with possession of liquor a few weeks ago and had pleaded guilty, he said. He was fined. He had no liquor in his possession at the time the charge was laid. The night before December 23 he had been drunk, he said. He was not drunk at the time he met Ryan and Lorraine Tait. His memory was clear, he said, about all that had happened. He was not sure how long he was on the boat after it arrived at Port Simpson. He thought it was about 15 minutes and it could not have been as much as an hour. All the drinking had been done in the pilot house. No one was cut or scratched on the trip over, he said.

ALFRED WESLEY

Alfred James Wesley, carpenter and fisherman, Port Simpson, said he had been in Prince Rupert December 23 but had not seen Ryan or Miss Tait. He went down to the dock at Port Simpson about 7 p.m. to pump out his boat, which was leaking. He heard a boat approach and when he went up on deck both Lorraine and Harold had called him to their boat. When he went over, they handed him a drink in a cup. When he tasted it and found it was wine, he spilled it on the deck. He was in a hurry to get away but, when he said he had to go, Lorraine caught his sweater, Harold said. "You are tearing it, you will have to replace it," Lorraine then took off her sweater and she and Ryan put it on Wesley. Police had asked about it the next day, he said. Lorraine had only a brassiere on the upper part of her body after she took off the sweater but was fully clothed in slacks from the waist down, he said.

On cross-examination, Wesley said he had not heard of Lorraine burning herself with seal grease. The pilot house was fairly dark. Only one bottle was in sight when he was there, he said. He did not give the sweater to the police the first time, he had talked with them, he said, but they asked him to keep it. They had picked it up later.
