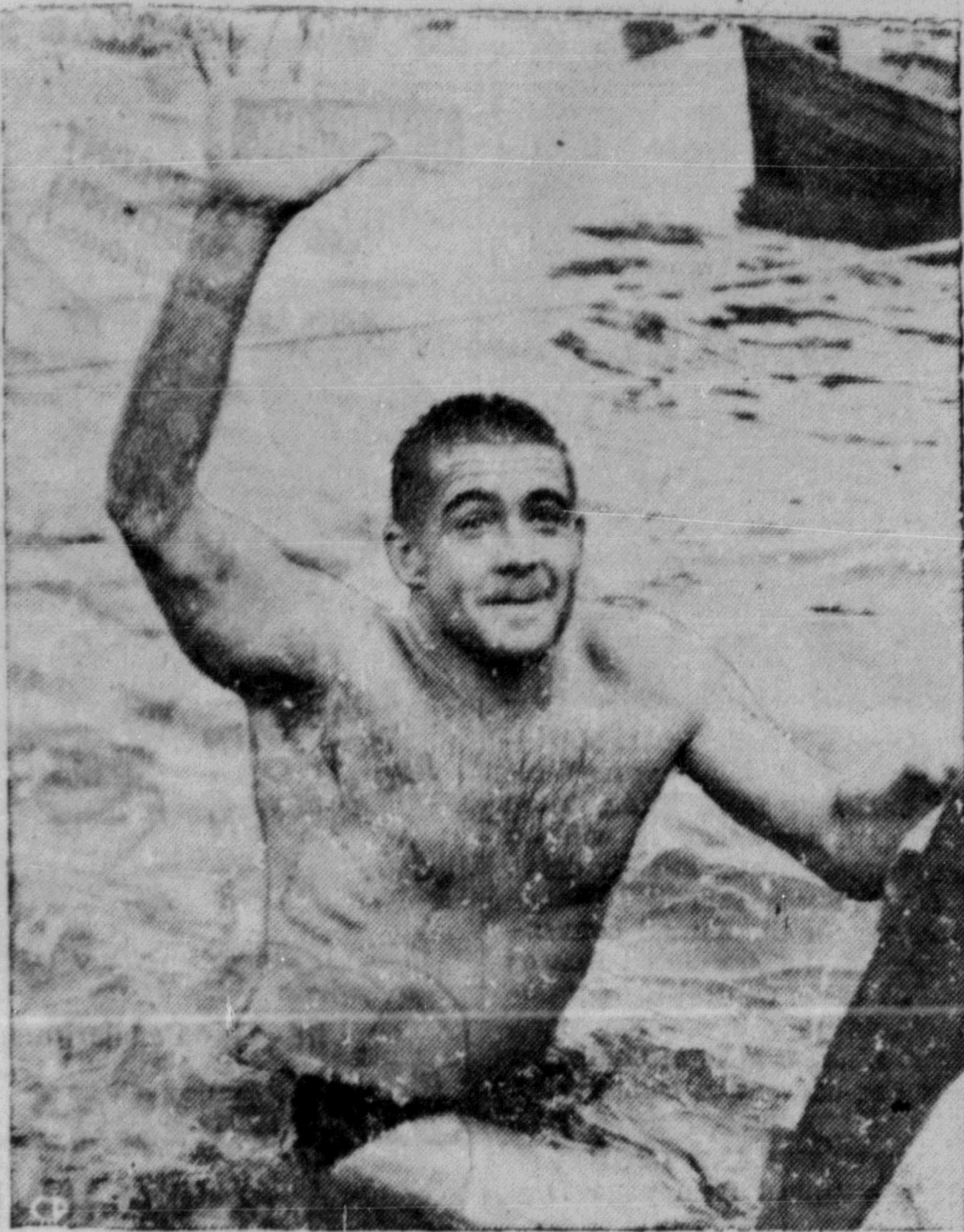

BATTER UP

Tonight's baseball game—fourth in the five-game best-of-three series—may tell a big story.

If Gordon & Anderson win the seven-inning affair, it's all over "but the shouting," and the hardware men will likely do a lot of it since they tickled the bottom of the league during the whole season.

They've won two out of three games in the finals so far. If Abel & Odowes take tonight's game, however, the two clubs will stand neck-and-neck and it will be a race to the finish which indicates a build-up for a terrific climax.

Already the finals have attracted the largest crowds so far this season. Last Sunday, stands were packed about as heavy as they were during the Ketchikan-Prince Rupert All-star series. Tonight should pack a larger crowd still, and, if there is a game next Sunday, we visualize a full house.

What are the odds, say, for tonight? It looks very much as though it's going to be a pitchers' game, more than any other, and if C & A can put a man on the mound who can hold his own, they stand a good chance to take the championship tonight.

Manager Stan Cornwell says it's likely he will start Carroll, the "talk-it-up" man on Roosevelt Park who's thrown some good ball lately.

The clothiers' lot isn't any cinch, either, although they've got the pitching strength. Lindsay is to start off, says Manager

Alex Bill, who feels pretty safe with Jack's good control.

It's the hitting power—or, rather, lack of it—that's probably worrying Manager Bill a bit. Although Nick Pavlikis is holding down around 400, few of the others in the line-up come close to 300 now, while Cornwell's own 430 leads a fair list of 300-and-over hitters.

Meanwhile, the softball league playoffs are now in the finals but Firemen and Rupert Radio are having a hard time to make their games count. Only one of three games played have tallied. First one to go out was a protested game; second game was taken by the Firemen, and the third, played last night, ended in a sudden draw, 6-6.

Weather still looks good, though, and if it lasts, softball finals should have a good turnout. The games are played centrally, and now, with the best teams in all-out competition, attendance should be much improved.

And, mentioning weather, it would be too bad if baseball stops at the end of the series and the good days keep right on. Another Ketchikan all-star game would seem certain to bring a good crowd and a lot of excitement here.

It is pretty late in the season but not too late yet to remind the Baseball Association that a first aid kit is a "must" requirement at the scene of organized baseball. Several times in the past, both league teams and visitors have suffered minor injuries, and discomfort from them can be much lessened through simple first-aid treatment.
