

# Hudson Bay Rail Chief Is Retiring

WINNIPEG. — The man who completed the Hudson Bay Railway to Churchill and brought the railway up to modern operating standard retired this week in the person of Major J. G. MacLachlan, its manager, whose career on the northern line commenced in 1926.

At a reception here, officers of the Canadian National Railways honored him with a presentation from the hands of Major J. L. Charles, chief engineer, following an introduction by J. R. McMillan, vice-president.

It marked the close of 46 years of service for the railway manager. During that time he has worked on construction in one capacity or another on railway lines reaching from northern Ontario to British Columbia.

Possibly his most difficult assignment was to rehabilitate the Hudson Bay Railway. As engineer in charge of the project, he extended the operation to the new port of Churchill. Until 1926, the proposed terminus was Port Nelson, now abandoned.

In World War II the Hudson Bay Railway carried a vast amount of freight during establishment of the Crimson Air Route to Europe via Churchill and polar islands. Major MacLachlan was the confidant of the military experts of three nations because of his ability to tackle engineering problems in the far north.
