"You experts," complained Mr. Muzzy, "are always telling me that I should have finessed when I didn't, and vice versa. What I want to know is, how can you tell when to finesse—and when to forget about finessing and just lay down your high cards."

"Well, it's an art, Muzzy," said Mr. Champion airily. "You're either born with it or..."
"Oh, come off it," replied Mr. Muzzy angrily. "Probably the one time you're sure of the right play is when you're blitzing and can see all the hands."

"Is that so?" snarled Mr. Champion. "Well, you could see all four hands and you still wouldn't know what to do."
"Just a minute, gentlemen," put in Mr. Masters, who usually assumes the role of peacemaker. "Muzzy asked a fair question. Let's outline for him the situations where the odds favor refusing the finesse."
Today's hand illustrates Mr. Masters' first point. The following series of hands will illustrate other situations where the finesse should be refused.

Mr. Champion opened the queen of hearts and Mr. Muzzy won with the ace. He immediately entered dummy with the king of clubs and led the jack of spades, letting it ride.
Here the fireworks started. Mr. Champion won with the king of spades. He led the jack of hearts and Miss Brash ruffed. She returned the queen of clubs, Mr. Muzzy played the ace and Mr. Champion ruffed. The ace of diamonds provided the setting trick.

Would you have made this hand? You should have. And I'm not saying that because I knew Mr. Champion had the king of spades. I'm just saying it because it's true.
Your main job here is not to locate the king of spades. It is to TAKE TEN TRICKS. This you can do by laying down the ace of spades at trick two and following with another spade. Now the opponents will win one spade trick instead of three. When you have reason to fear a cross-ruff by the enemy, get as many of their trumps out as fast as you can.

Famous Porcelain Shown by Royalty

LONDON (CP)—Specimens of historic Chelsea china were loaned by royalty for the exhibition of famous porcelain held this month at the Royal Hospital, Chelsea, home since the 17th century of military pensioners.

The exhibition was arranged by the Chelsea Society in co-operation with the British Arts Council as part of the celebrations of the Festival of Britain, and exhibits were sent by King George, Queen Elizabeth and Queen Mary.

The famous Chelsea china factory which produced many of the exhibits was founded in 1745. Nicholas Sprimont, silversmith from Liege, Belgium, took charge of the factory two years later.

From the royal collection came a pair of silver-gilt crawfish salts designed by Sprimont.

Queen Elizabeth's exhibits reflected the influence of the Chelsea Garden of which the famous physician Sir Hans Sloane was the patron. He inspired the "Hans Sloane Flowers" that were reproduced on many pieces of china. Some of these were loaned by Queen Elizabeth, who also contributed some charming small treasures in the shape of a cauliflower, asparagus and melons.

North Not Hit Badly

Prince Rupert based fishermen won't suffer the same hardships experienced this year by fishermen of the southern B.C. fishing areas.

Although many of the main fishing areas in the south have been closed on account of dry weather, only one area in northern waters remains unfished at the beginning of the chum season.

Fisheries Department said today that actually only the Bella Inlet for chum salmon would begin Bella area, where normally fish-September 1, has been closed due to low water in streams which has prevented pink salmon reaching spawning grounds.

Consequently, pinks, ready for spawning, are still "milling around" in waters of Fitzgugh Sound and Burke Channel, and closure there for conservation is in effect.

Meanwhile, seine fishing areas at Pearce and Portland Canals are closing tonight until further notice.

Areas open to seine fishing are Wharfedale Channel, Upper Matheson Channel, Seaforth Channel, Riverside Inlet, Fisher Channel, Smith Inlet and all of Queen Charlotte Islands areas.

Gillnet fishing is allowed in the Naas River, Smith and Riverside inlets areas with sockeye nets. Other areas open are the Skeena River, Principi Channel, Gardner Canal and all areas open to seining.

The run of chum salmon in areas of the Queen Charlotte Islands is reported low so far.
