HERE and NOW

TODAY I TOURED the new King Edward school as guest of hospitable Robert G. Moore, principal. Mr. Moore loves his new school as do all the teachers and "mostly all" the students. As much as the 41-year-old building—which the new school replaces—looked ancient in design, as much does the new structure look modern in every way. It's practically ultra-modern.

Manufacturers must have put on extra shifts to supply all the glass for King Edward, for the classrooms at least are practically all window. To further augment the lighting system, indirect incandescence is reflected from a ceiling which slopes sharply upward towards the windows.

The pleasing, pastel-shaded color scheme was also considered in the predominating eye-saving features throughout the school.

ELECTRONICS play an integral part in this school. By means of a public address system, orders, recordings, or radio programs can be transmitted to any individual room throughout the building.

A unique feature is the PA link to the auditorium where stage productions can be hooked up to all rooms.

THE MAIN ENTRANCE which faces Green Street leads straight towards a novel display case on the wall opposite to the door. Displayed here is not the best work of the best students, but of those in the cellar. That is, Mr. Moore explained, the most improved work is being shown here.

"This gives those of average or less ability in certain subjects added initiative to bring their work up to par. We think it helps a lot because students are proud to have their work displayed in public."

ALL WORK and no play is not for this modern day, says Mr. Moore, and so we entered the "fresh-air" play room, which is an extension underneath the gymnasium and, although not quite completed, provides several thousand feet of playing space roofed in.

This area, which gives ready access to the school playground will prove very handy, Mr. Moore believes, for it will keep the children protected from rain but at the same time gives them all the fresh air of the outdoors. There are no windows here, but heavy mesh screen is used on three sides.

The play room will provide a place for indoor games, semi-outdoor games, and sandboxes for the beginning grades.

Wa'hrooms lead off from the hallway near the playroom and these are decorated in traditional blue for boys and pink for girls' style.

The girls have one "beef," however, says Mr. Moore. Although the blue paper towels are OK for the boys, they have to be used by girls as well. Manufacturers just don't make pink paper towels.

(Paper towel manufacturers take note!)

EATING IS A big item and to make the lunch period more convenient and comfortable, an 80-place lunchroom has been designed with tables and chairs and a kitchen from which milk, hot chocolate, hot soups will be served with the aid of the King Edward Parent-Teachers Association.

Only school in Prince Rupert to have a separate nurses' office, this medical room contains a couch and cot and convenient facilities for nursing equipment.

Blackwood on Bridge

It was a pleasure to watch Mr. Masters wrap up 12 tricks on this hand against the best defence. The six of diamonds was opened and Mr. Abel made the right play of the nine spot.

After winning the first trick with the queen of diamonds, Mr. Masters entered dummy with the king of clubs and led the 10 of spades. When Mr. Abel played the king, 11 tricks were in sight. There were still two losing diamond tricks because Mr. Abel held the ace-jack of diamonds over dummy's king.

One way to get rid of one of the diamonds in the closed hand was to take a heart finesse. But that wouldn't have worked, as you see. Mr. Masters led one round of hearts, winning with dummy's ace. He didn't learn much about how the suit lay.

Next he led out all of his spades and cashed the ace of clubs. This left him with three cards—a heart and two diamonds.

In the dummy at this stage were the king-jack of hearts and the king of diamonds. During the running of the spade suit Mr. Abel suffered mightily. He threw away all of his clubs, the nine of hearts and all of his diamonds but the ace and jack.

When the ace of clubs was cashed against him he had to make one more discard. He chose the jack of diamonds which was the best he could do.

Mr. Masters now led a diamond, played dummy's king and
