RESERVE JUDGMENT IN LIQUOR CASE

Case of Theft was Dismissed by Magistrate McMorde in the Police Court.

This morning in the police court, Mrs. Gertrude Brown was charged with the theft of two shirts in the Windsor Hotel. Accused arrived in the city about a week ago and from the evidence given by the hotel housekeeper the shirts had been in the closet for months. They were found in a grip in the accused's room. Accused, who testified, alleged that the grip did not belong to her, but was left in her room by another guest at the hotel. The charge was dismissed.

The court then proceeded to hear a further charge of having intoxicating liquor in her possession, being contrary to the provisions of the Prohibition Act. Constable Bailey in evidence, stated that he had found two bottles of whisky outside the window of the accused's room, on the roof of the light well. After hearing the evidence, Magistrate McMorde reserved judgment until tomorrow morning.

PLENTY OF FOOD FOR THE WORLD DURING THE WINTER

Brussels, Sept. 22.—The world need have no fear of a food shortage during the coming winter providing there is proper care in handling the product and proper distribution, said George H. Roberts, British food controller, and one of the delegates to the Supreme Council, speaking here today. Other delegates concurred in this view.

Mr. Roberts is laying special emphasis on the possibility of re-organizing the transport service to meet food problems.

FALKENHAYN BLAMES GERMAN GOVERNMENT FOR THEIR FAILURE

Berlin, Sept. 23.—In his forthcoming book dealing with the events from 1914 to 1916 in connection with the great war, General von Falkenhayn, former chief of the German army, complains of the Government's failure to adopt his proposals in 1915 for the inauguration of peace negotiations with Russia. He also blames the Government for its delay in beginning submarine warfare, whereby, he says, the German people were deprived of a "sure and effective weapon."
