Drought Costs Province Seven Million Dry Spell Unbroken

VANCOUVER (CP) - Drought-today is the 51st rainless day—has cost British Columbia \$7,000,-000, it was estimated today. A survey of the recordbreaking drought shows millions lost in unemployment, razed timber tracts, ruined crops and general losses in industry.

Today 25,000 men are out of work in British Columbia as compared with 19,000 reported a week ago.

Thousands of the unemployed are highly paid loggers who are estimated to have lost \$4,000,-Logging operators' losses are

placed at \$2,000,000 and farmers' at \$1,000,000.

Fifty-one days have now elapsed since appreciable rainfall fell over the southwestern sections of British Columbia and there is no real indication this morning that there will be any in the next 36 hours A long dry spell record for the southern mainland is being set. The remnants of a Pacific disturbance which has been drifting toward the coast for the past few days will cause considerable cloud and rain over the north coast and a little cloudiness elsewhere over the coast The fresher Pacific air accompanying this disturbance will also serve to lower a little the afternoon temperatures in most regions by tomorrow.

In the interior some cloudiness and a few showers will result in northern sections as the disturbance moves inland. Over the southern sections it will continue mostly clear and warm although there will be a little cloudiness in the late afternoon as the air becomes more moist.

Forecast North coast region - Cloudy with showers today and tonight. Cloudy tomorrow. Little change in temperature. Winds-southerly (15) today shifting over night to westerly (15). Lows tonight and highs tomorrow—at Port Hardy, Sandspit and Prince Rupert, 52 and 62.


