Ski Facilities Improving Rapidly

AUCKLAND, N.Z. (CP)—Ski facilities in New Zealand are improving so rapidly that New Zealand seems likely to make a bid to become the main winter sport centre of the southern hemisphere.

Hitherto sportsmen visiting New Zealand have come chiefly for trout and big game fishing, but in the last few years there has been a growing influx of tourists to the ski resorts in winter which here corresponds to the summer months in North America.

Already large numbers of Australian enthusiasts make regular ski trips to New Zealand each winter and there are increasing numbers of visitors from other Pacific countries. There have been some North American skiers at the resorts this season.

Although facilities for skiers in New Zealand are still a long way below those in Canada, the development since the war has been remarkable. Facilities are now much greater than those in Australia and further big improvements are likely in the near future.

New Zealand resorts are mostly well away from centres of population and development has been very different from in Canada. Large areas of New Zealand's illimitable ski terrain have been opened up by ski clubs. Members have built huts far beyond the ends of the roads by voluntary labor, manhandling the materials up difficult mountain slopes and doing the construction work themselves. A very low nightly hut fee is charged, usually about 50 cents.

BIG CENTRES
The two largest ski centres are operated by the government in the North Island and by a private company in the south. The latter development is the nearest New Zealand approach to the normal ski resort abroad. Skiers live at Queenstown, a popular resort with numerous hotels, set at the edge of a beautiful lake amid spectacular mountain scenery. A private firm has undertaken the development of ski facilities at Coronet Peak (5400 feet) not far away. Skiers travel by a half-raising road to the foot of the first tow at 3880 feet. From there a system of three tows takes skiers to the summit. The beautiful condition of the snow and the long spells of un-

broken fine weather in the winter have amazed visitors. George Savage, ski instructor from Sun Valley, Idaho, who has been instructing at Coronet Peak this season, declared: "I have never seen anything like it in my life."

The North Island's main ski resort at National Park, in the centre of the island, contains a group of three periodically active volcanoes. On the slopes of 9,175-foot Mount Ruapehu is the Chateau Tongariro, one of New Zealand's largest and most luxurious hotels. No fewer than 14 ski clubs have also built huts higher up the mountain, but the government, which owns and operates the hotel, has also taken responsibility for the development of the ski fields.

Mount Ruapehu offers fine ski slopes almost to its summit. As a result there are thousands of feet of continuous downhill running in winter and a season which extends into the summer. In a normal season skiers who are prepared to climb can get skiing from June through December.
