## Third Place Hockey Tie

BOSTON—Boston Bruins moved into a third place tie with the idle Montreal Canadiens in the National Hockey League Tuesday night by playing a one-all tie with New York Rangers.

The crowd was the smallest to see a National Hockey League game here in at least seventeen years—4,888 persons.

It was the third tie in four contests between the two clubs this season and left Boston without a victory on home ice this season although the Bruins have tied five games while losing four.

The Boston winger, Adam Brown, equalled the National Hockey League record when he scored after fifteen seconds of play in the first period. This matched the speed mark set by Gus Bodnar, now of Chicago Black Hawks, in his first game for Toronto in 1943.

Nick Mickoski of New York evened matters up in the second period.

Tonight Chicago Black Hawks met the Rangers at New York.
