Communists Fighting Back

TOKYO (CP) - Two stabbed across the Red Korean border today in a daring challenge to Chinese offensive build-up.

One column struck across the 38th parallel, north of Uijongbu on the western front, then pulled back before dusk.

Another thrust was made into Red lands north of Chungpyong reservoir, on the central front. Both ran into fierce fights.

An armored force, north of Uijongbu, fought off Red antitank guns, mortar and handgrenade attacks. It stayed 31/2 hours in Red territory.


