**Steel Buildings
For Atlin Mine**

Prefabricated, all-steel buildings are playing a key role in the B.C. mining boom.

Transcontinental Resources Ltd., of Vancouver, is erecting \$45,000 worth of these units on its Black Diamond tungsten property in the Atlin district and at its Spud Valley development on the west coast of Vancouver Island.

The four units involved will provide living, dining, office and storage accommodation, and are being erected by the supplier, Keystone Industries Limited, of Vancouver.

They were "packaged" in Vancouver, complete with finishing materials, including lining, insulation, flooring and prefabricated metal chimneys, and shipped to the mining sites by water.

Speakers for Keystone Industries remark that from three to six all-steel prefabricated structures are being turned out each week at their Vancouver plant.

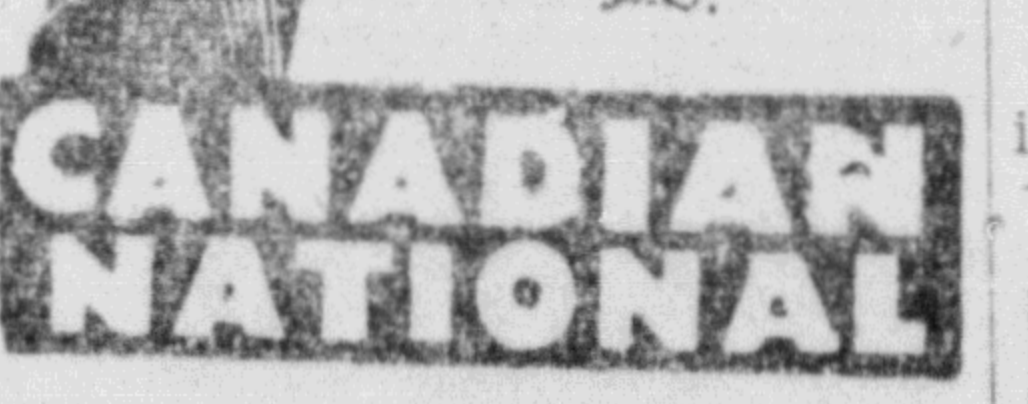
They report a particular demand from the mining industry owing to the quick availability of the units, their easy shipping and erecting features, and because they minimize the fire hazard in remote areas.

**Drama of
Shipping**

**Wartime Freighters
Being Pulled Out of
Moatballs at Boston**

BOSTON—A drama of shipping is being enacted in Boston as Liberty ships, idle since shortly after the end of World War II, are reconditioned for emergency service.

Coming into Boston rusted and deserted at the end of a top-rope, with their machinery idle and their holds bare and rusty, these big ships are being fixed and shined to do more yeoman duty in carrying cargoes of grain and coal to our European allies. Lying at berths in the Bethlehem Shipyard at East Boston today are two rust-colored Liberties stripped to the bare hull of all rigging, deck fittings, and other accoutrements carried by ships that are ready for sea. It has been several years since smoke swirled up their stacks and the rattle of pans and dishes sounded in galleys and mess-rooms.

Just 10 years ago these ships were blueprints on drawing boards or patterns in the laying-out lifts of shipyards helping to build the greatest cargo fleet ever to steam the seas.

GANGS AT WORK
During the war years they carried guns, ammunition, trucks, tanks, and other material to the fighting fronts, risking submarines, dive bombers, and mines to supply the invasion armies. Today they are being readied for service in the cold war against Soviet communism in Europe.

Today, there are gangs of workmen aboard these ships scraping the hulls, spraying paint, ripping out moisture-rusted deck coverings, repairing neglected boilers, replacing bearings, and doing hundreds of other jobs necessary to refit an idle ship for active service.

In a short time these rusted hulls with their bare masts and empty crew rooms will be transformed into bright, newly painted, and completely outfitted ships.
