## Win Second Victory Over Pentiction For 139-104 Aggregate

Don Scherk Receives Most Valuable Player Award For Year

Prince Rupert Jets are the winners of the British Columbia Senior "B" basketball championship Star Trophy for the third time in the past four years, having won their second successive victory over the Pentiction Omegas by a 73 to 58 score at the Civic Centre on Saturday night. Their total score in the two game total point series was 139, which gave the Jets a 35-point margin on the series as Pentiction scored 104 points in the two games.

The two teams were closely matched on Saturday night when the Omegas more accustomed to the local floor. In the first half it looked as though Pentiction was going to make a real bid for the title as they overcame the Jets early lead to pull 8 points ahead at 22 to 14. However, the Jets were definitely the best team throughout the series and they demonstrated this when they held the Omegas at the 22 point margin to run in 13 successive points taking the half at 27 to 22. Once again in the second half the Omegas looked dangerous as they came within one point of the locals at 45 to 46. Again the Jets pulled away ahead to finish the game and the series at 73 to 58.

Jim Flaten topped the scoring for Rupert as he piled up 21 points, 17 of them in the second half. Don Scherk again played sensationally to get 20 points, making a total of 39 for the two games. Ray Spring came through with 16, to net 35 for the series. Once again the Davis, Olson and Holkestad combination kept the Omegas high scoring Raitt well in check and held him down to 6 points. Raitt left the floor early in the second half on five fouls and received a big hand from the crowd for his smart play throughout the series. Prince Rupert lost Joe Davis on five fouls and he too received an ovation from the crowd.

For the losers Powell was high man with 12. Douglas scored 11, and both Tidball and Raptis added 10 apiece to the score. The Omegas gave everything they had but there was no stopping the fast-stepping Jets. It was a cleanly fought series, and although Referees Basil Sands and Ole Slatta called 25 fouls on the losers and 21 on the winners, there was never any hard feeling between the two teams. It is unusual to witness an important basketball series without seeing the players beef at some of the calls made by the officials, but this one was an exception, as decisions were never questioned and there was good feeling and sportsmanship throughout.

**TROPHIES PRESENTED**  
The Star Trophy was presented to Team Captain Joe Davis, by Don Forward, representing the B.C. Amateur Basketball Association. Captain Chuck Raitt of the Omegas complimented the Jets on their good sportsmanship and stated that the best team was certainly the winner with no excuses being offered by the Omegas. Angus Macphie, President of the Prince Rupert Basketball Association, presented Coach Alex Bill with a gift from his team members and the Association and also presented a gift of flowers to Mrs. Bill.

A highlight of the evening was the presentation of the 1950-51 good sportsmanship trophy to Rupert Holkestad and the most valuable player award to Don Scherk.

At the half time interval league and play-off trophies were presented to team captains by Weldon McAfee, vice-president of the local Association.

Sonny Beynon received the Senior League play-off trophies for the Co-ops. Henry Blackaby was presented with the Intermediate League trophy for Hi-Golds, winners of the Intermediate league, and Jim Hebb of Fashion Footwear, the trophy emblematic of intermediate play-off victory.

In the Junior division, William Blackaby was presented with both league and play-off trophies for the High Juniors, double winners in this division. Winners of the Juvenile championship were the Booth 3 entry, and Robert Pedersen received the trophy from Mr. McAfee.
