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

A joint delegation from the Civic Centre Association arena committee and the Canadian Legion approached city council last night with a proposition for transferring a portion of the Legion's waterfront property for the purpose of building skating and curring rinks.

Speaking for the arena committee, Dr. L. M. Greene said the committee was exploring the possibilities of covered hockey and curling rinks. He said at the time being an arena would be a difficult proposition both financially and in the obtaining of materials. However, he said, it was desirable to have a site so that work could be started as soon as money and materials were available.


