## ENGLISHMEN VICTORIOUS

Win at Football Over the Callies by Score of Three to One. Sons of England 3, Callies 1.

that was the score in the final of the exhibition games played last night on the Athletic grounds. It was a great victory. The Sons may play a poor game occasionally against other teams, but they always give of their best against the Scots, and they did it last night. They played the dashing, swinging type of football which pays better than the more methodical methods of the Scotsmen which are more adapted to velvety turf.

Playing down hill in the first half gave the Callies an advantage but the Englishmen crossed over with a lead of one goal, scoring from a breakaway by Percy Tinker. Bennett, the Callie centre, was too well marked to be effective and was a trifle wild in his shooting.

In the second half a penalty kick against Jim Currie was converted by Robinson, and Tinker added one more with a good shot which Clapperton stopped but did not clear. Bennett reduced the adverse majority with a good effort, but in spite of some good work by Tommy Black the whistle blew with England triumphant.

For the winners the outstanding players were Tinker, Robinson and Kelsey. Percy plays good football and always knows where the goal is. Robinson and Kelsey worked untiingly and for an old timer at the game the latter seemed the sprightliest man on the field.

The losers were rather off color. Their best men were probably Georgie Abbott at half, and Tom Black and Harry Foote forward.

A good crowd attended the game and got their reward in clean and exciting football. Geo. Russell refereed in an effective manner. The teams were:

## WAS DELIVERED BY AEROPLANE

Glasses for Passenger on Ship Sent From Seattle and Dropped Aboard Vessel.

Victoria, Sept. 26.—In the excitement of departure from Seattle aboard the N. Y. K. liner Suwa Maru a well known lady of the Queen City had the misfortune to drop her glasses overboard and faced the prospect of considerable inconvenience during the trans-Pacific passage. The loss was noticed by the lady's friends on the dock and prompt steps were taken to replace the glasses by wiring the prescription to Victoria in the hope that the order could be filled before the Suwa's departure from this port on her outward trip to the Far East.

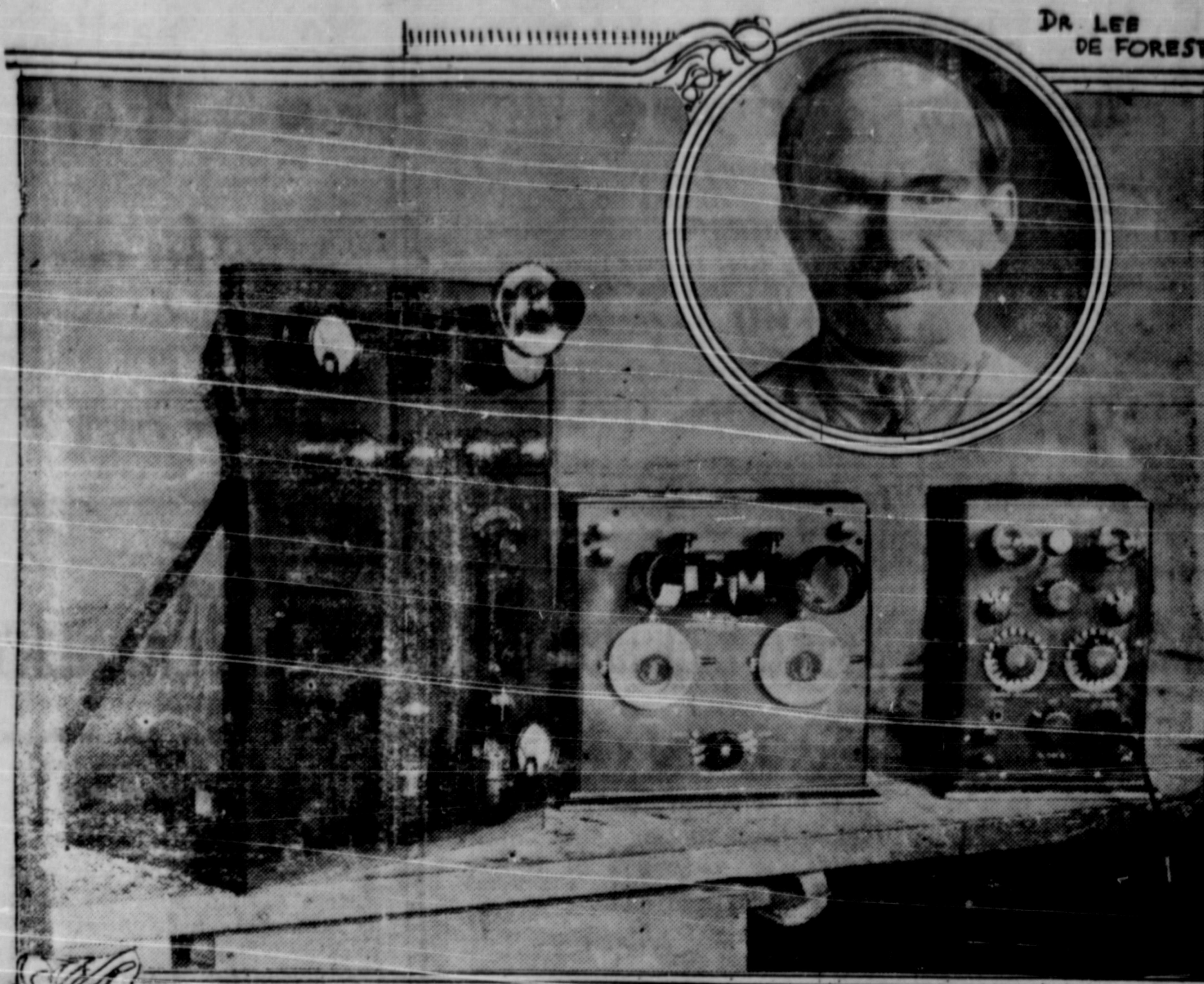
Within three hours the new glasses were available and were delivered at the Outer Docks as the liner drew alongside. It was then learned, however, that the prescription had also been filled at Seattle and dispatched to the outbound ship by seaplane.

**Ship Overtaken.**  
The Boeing seaplane overhauled the Suwa Maru off Port Townsend and manoeuvred aloft to drop the package which had been carefully wrapped in several layers of cotton batten, on the deck of the liner. Expectantly the passengers aboard the ship watched the operations of the airman, who was doing his level best to bomb the liner.

**Fished Out of Sea.**  
When dead overhead the weighted package was dropped, but evidently the speed of the ship was not truly calculated by the pilot of the seaplane, for the precious spectacles missed the objective and fell harmlessly into the sea. Not to be outdone, the air pilot circled around and, dropping a grappling hook, succeeded in picking up the floating package, and at the next attempt the eyeglasses were safely delivered aboard the ship. The opportunity was not overlooked by the movie operators of the Universal Film Company, who were travelling to the Orient aboard the Suwa Maru.

## PIONEER INVENTOR PERFECTS SMALLEST WIRELESS 'PHONE

DR. LEE DE FOREST

In a rather plain, barely furnished, cement floored office just to the right of his main laboratory at High Bridge, New York, Dr. Lee de Forest, pioneer worker for the perfection of wireless telephony, sits hourly before the smallest wireless telephone outfit ever made and converses freely with several different persons whose receivers have been tuned up properly. Although the walls of the laboratory are a labyrinth of wires that look like snarled worsted, not a wire runs out of the modern building in Sedgwick avenue. Dr. de Forest needs no wires to talk to his friends. This latest, the smallest wireless receiver and transmitter ever perfected, is the latest child of the de Forest prolific brain. It is his pet. It will be known, when it is ready to be commercialized, as the radiophone, and was made especially for use on ranches, farms and other places where wires are impractical. In this machine, for the first time, alternating current has been tamed enough to use in connection with wireless telephony. This in itself is considered by electricians and inventors as a wonderful achievement.
