### First Plate of First Steel Ship is Put in Place by the Duke of Devonshire Saturday

In Presence of Large Crowd and under Ideal Weather Conditions, the Shipbuilding Era at This Port is Officially Inaugurated by His Excellency; Description of the Vessels and Something about the Plant and Staff.

The first steel plate of the first big ship to be built in Prince Rupert was laid on Saturday afternoon by the Governor General, His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire.

The slip was all ready, the keel blocks were in place and the plate, number 151, was suspended above its proper position by pulley blocks. A temporary platform had been erected for the occasion with seats for the guests, the whole being decorated with the flags of the Allies and the sun was shining gloriously, far from well, has no intention arrived from the east by last enabling the crowds to gather to enjoy the occasion.
