United Church May Re-open
Logging for Cellulose—
Rain and Snow

Rev. T. C. Colwell, minister of the United Church at Port Simpson, was here last week to investigate the possibilities of making arrangements for a monthly service for this district. There has been no resident minister for some considerable time and it is felt that the time is now ripe to have, at least, a monthly service to the community. The United Church has been closed since Rev. W. Nixon left here for another pastorate. Service was held at Premier on Thursday and in Stewart on Sunday in the Anglican Church. Both services were well attended.

A VILLAGE GROWS—

Houston Now Thriving Community—500 People

HOUSTON.—From a village in 1947 with two cars, two telephones, old hotel, old garage, one-roomed school and two million feet a year shipped out, Houston has become a thriving community, of over five hundred from the figures of the last census, with twenty million feet a year shipped out from two planer mills, with a total payroll of \$30,000 a month—the Houston Planer Co. Ltd. and the E. G. Bellicini Planing Mill.

and a little mining were the chief activities.

In 1930 there were tie contracts to be dealt with, and in 1940, Dutch immigrants began to arrive and started to give the district a stability with their industry in agriculture. Now over half the population is Dutch, with a hundred per cent Dutch crew in the Houston mill. There is a ready market for the produce of the farming community in the camps of the fifteen to twenty sawmills in the district.

Lumber demands during the war, and the boom in lumber in 1943 and 1947 has made the village what it is. A four-roomed school built last year, with the possibility of another room having to be added, a new garage, three cafes, a modern butcher's shop, two modern stores, a clothing store, fancy goods' shop, and new hotel with eighteen rooms, six having private baths, provide for the needs of the community. There are four churches, including a Christian Reformed, which has services in both Dutch and English, and new Forestry buildings.

In an interview, C. Parish, manager of Houston Planer Mill Co. Ltd., showed the plans for the proposed Medical building, which it is hoped to build next year. Two thousand dollars have already been raised. A picture show is held each week, and the proceeds go to the fund.

"A definite future in the industry is insured," volunteered Mr. Parish. "The Houston Planer Mill is working to full capacity, the greater part of the development has taken place in the last two years and production doubled last year. We are planning new machinery for next year, and there is an application in for a management license. We have secured markets of our own. Unfortunately, the village is served with one congested party telephone which for business purposes is an impossible situation."

In 1947, a Community Club was incorporated to serve the interests of the community. Picnic grounds were set aside, "For the use, recreation, and enjoyment of the public," and one of its undertakings is street lighting.

Over a year ago, the B. C. Power Commission installed a plant on a part time basis, as an experiment. Within a very short time it was paying for itself and additions in the plant have had to be made, and are about to be made again to take care of the increase.

Plans are in hand to open up an old road, between Houston and the west end of Francois Lake, and the Forestry Branch are considering putting a road from Houston, south, for twenty or thirty miles into a tract of timber. There are indications of development in mining.

A sign of the present prosperity, is that a sub-branch of the Royal Bank of Canada is shortly to be opened here, giving a weekly service to start with, later to be extended to a full branch bank.

Storm at Ketchikan

Two Boats Sunk and One Burned—Ward's Cove Isolated

KETCHIKAN.—A check-up of the week-end storm in Southeastern Alaska showed two trolling boats sunk, one burned and numerous others damaged.

There was no loss of life in the storm which brought winds estimated at 70 miles an hour and there was 5½ inches of rain here.

The trolling boat Hazel, owned by Arden Cole, sank at Metlakatla Harbor entrance.

The troller Elsie III was abandoned on the rocks of Mossman Inlet by the owners, Lars Larson, and two companions.

The 30-foot cruiser Pamarajah, owned by Russ Cowger, caught fire and exploded while Cowger was in the woods hunting.

Other boats were torn loose from their moorings without serious loss or damage.

First bridge on the road to Ward's Cove was washed out.


