...plars, and now and again yellow green will appear by the side of the shining railway track.

We encircled the island until we could see the cabin with Y.R. on the front. While landing I could see that a path had been made all round the island and that the trees, birch, poplar, spruce, alder, and willow were now about fifty feet high.

"Old timers know about this," said Walter, as we walked towards the cabin. "A year before I came here, Bill Saunders of Palling had started a Young Ranger Band in 1929, after the youngsters there had turned out on their own to put out a forest fire there. I liked the idea, and Mrs. Wilson and I started a group of Young Ranger boys and girls here in 1930, and when we started to clear the island the trees were lying ten to fifteen feet deep after a disastrous fire. Some of the trees were two feet in diameter. We worked evening after evening, and at the weekends clearing and burning, and it was finally cleared in 1932."

"How about this lovely cabin?" I asked.

"The young people thought they would like a club-house," Walter went on. "So we cut logs from the mainland and a half mile down the lake, the Young Rangers loaded the sleighs and from the ice two of Palling's Young Rangers brought teams and hauled the logs up to the building site. I thought it best that the building should be permanent, and so money was raised, and the two best cabin-builders in the district built it, on rock foundations which extend to the rock of the island."

"When Canon Hinchcliffe, then Minister of Education, was initiated into the Young Fangers' secret society, he wanted to know what he could do to help along this fine ideal, and I suggested that the island be made a public park dedicated to the use of the Young Rangers, as long as they existed as an organized band, and this was done. Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor-General of Canada, formally opened and dedicated the island and clubhouse in 1935, when he and his company, and many others now in many parts of the world were initiated into the society. Mrs. Wilson and I held camps on the island for four years, and the Forestry Branch put up sufficient money to run the camps afterwards for some years."

"As we entered the cabin, Walter remarked: "This door has never been locked. All visitors are welcome, and the motto on the wall, "Let no one say, and say it to your shame, that all was beauty here until you came," has undoubtedly helped to protect the cabin and island. Hundreds of people have enjoyed the island, and in winter, knowing that they would find shelter and wood ready cut, they have made a fire, and left as much as found, the law of the woods."

Boys and girls from the Queen Charlotte Islands to McBride attended these Young Ranger camps, and undoubtedly did a great deal to change the whole tenor of thought as to the value of the forests, getting the idea and ideal over to the older people. Prior to 1930 the cost of fighting forest fires had been over forty thousand dollars annually, with a tremendous loss of valuable timber. In the following five years, in this district, the cost of fire fighting was less than five hundred dollars, with no loss of valuable timber.

### Butedale to Kitimat Run

Former Fisheries Patrol Vessel Going On Daily Service

The former fisheries patrol vessel Nitinat has been bought by the Morrison-Knudsen Co. of Canada Ltd., holder of contracts for varied parts of the Aluminum Co. of Canada undertakings in Northern British Columbia.

The Nitinat will be utilized for daily passenger service from Kitimat and Kitimat to Butedale, which is a regular stopping place for coastal steamers.

The Nitinat is a ninety-foot wooden ship. With diesel engines she has a speed of ten knots.
