Blackwood on Bridge

Usually it is easy to see how to set up a long, nearly solid suit, or even a short suit which is missing only one or two honors. Sometimes, however, it is the short, shabby-looking suit that saves the day.

Mr. Abel led the deuce of diamonds in response to Miss Brash's aggressive overcall. Mr. Dale won in his own hand with the king, took three rounds of trumps and then cashed the ace of diamonds.

Now it was practically certain that Miss Brash had the ace of clubs for her overcall at the three range. But even so Mr. Dale felt that he would lose two club tricks if he led the suit himself.

The old master decided to try to establish dummy's pitiful-looking spade suit. If spades were divided 3-3, the fourth spade on the board would provide a discard for one of his clubs. And there was also the chance that when the opponents were in with spades, they would have to lead to their disadvantage.

So Mr. Dale laid down the ace

of spades and followed with the 10. Mr. Abel won the second spade with the king. He realized that a diamond lead at this point would be ruffed in dummy and a loser discarded from the closed hand. Therefore he came out with the deuce of clubs. Mr. Dale played the nine from the board and Miss Brash won with the ace.

Now Miss Brash had three choices—all of them bad. A diamond return would permit a ruff in dummy and discard from Mr. Dale's hand. A low club return would undoubtedly ride to dummy's jack. And if the queen of spades were cashed, the eight spot on the board would become a very big card indeed.

The only hope seemed to be that Mr. Abel had the king of clubs so Miss Brash returned the seven of that suit. But, as she had feared, dummy's jack won and Mr. Dale spread the hand, conceding a spade trick, but making four odd.
