Red Price is Held Too High

TOKYO (P) — There has been no response as yet from General Matthew B. Ridgway's headquarters to the Peiping broadcast Thursday night which said that Korean cease-fire talks "could start again immediately" and an agreement quickly reached if the United Nations would take the blame for all neutrality violations the Reds have charged. However, the price asked by the Communists appears to be too high for the Allied commander to accept.

The Red offer was not made on the official level. It came during a Peiping broadcast dispatch quoting a Communist correspondent in Kaesong.
