two other factors. First, bidding
from Miss Brash doesn't always
mean what it says, and second,
the way Mr. Masters plays the
cards means a very great deal.

leading diamonds? Maybe, but

that an opponent would ruff a
second round of diamonds.

USES DOUBLE

Finally Mr. Masters used Mr.
Able's double to advantage in
reaching his decision. He figured
Mr. Able might have decided to
double because he held the two
red aces and four spades to the
ten. Accordingly he made an un-
blocking play at the first trick.

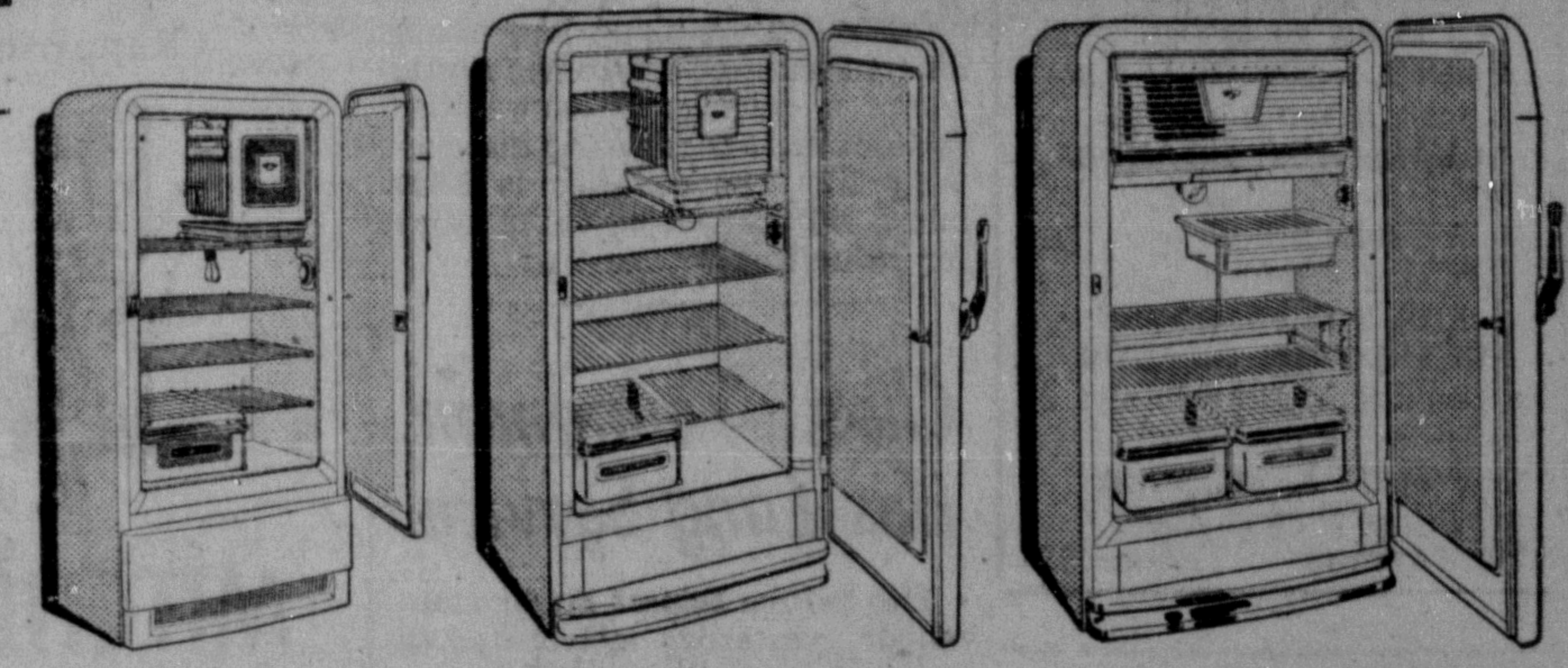
