DIRECTORS CHOSEN FOR NEXT FAIR

Annual Meeting of Association Held Last Night in the Council Chamber.

PRESIDENT PERRY REVIEWS THE WORK

A board of directors composed almost wholly of business men was chosen last night by the Northern B. C. Agricultural and Industrial Association at the adjourned annual meeting held in the council chamber at the city hall. The reports of the officers were received and adopted and the directors were thanked for the work they had done during the year. The finances were reported in a healthy condition and there was every indication that good work had been done.

President Perry gave an outline of the year. He told of starting the year with something over \$1,600 to the good and with this they had improved the building in many ways. They also thanked the city for its co-operation in improving the roadway to the building. He recommended that another year they provide substantial booths outside. This year the gale blew the flimsy booths down and those who had purchased concessions had to go inside the building.

Suggestions.
Two things were lacking. One was the sending of one or more directors to the outside points to interest people in sending exhibits and thus getting in closer touch with the outside points; the other was the absence of any substantial outside attraction such as an aeroplane. The band contest, however, had been a success, as all enjoyed the music.

The president spoke of the value of the policy of granting free space to exhibitors of industrial displays. He mentioned particularly the exhibit of the Free Miners League and the decorations which were in charge of Alderman Barrie.

Mr. Perry said he was opposed to having a baby show another year, but favored rather a better baby contest in which marks for efficiency would be given by trained judges.

In moving a hearty vote of thanks to the directors for their work during the year, George Munro said that the merchants could not attend meetings on Saturday night.
