But playing with Mr. Muzzy, Mr. Dale felt such a lead was much more likely to gain than to lose. In other words, Mr. Muzzy is always confused anyway, so why not try to get everybody confused?

Mr. Dale decided to open his club suit and, of course, his normal lead is the fourth highest club. However, in an effort to give Mr. Champion a wrong picture of his distribution, the old boy promptly laid down his fifth highest club, the deuce.

Now there was no reason for Mr. Champion not to figure this lead as a "standard" fourth highest. And if it were, then Mr. Dale had exactly four clubs and Mr. Muzzy, two. Mr. Muzzy didn't think about the lead at all.

He just went up with his king and was surprised when it held the trick. He returned the seven of clubs and Mr. Champion won with the ace. Mr. Dale dropping the eight spot.

Counting up his winners, Mr. Champion saw that he had five diamonds, one club, one spade and one heart. For his ninth trick he could try either the spade or the heart finesse. But which? He decided that running the entire diamond suit might furnish some clue to the right play.

On the last three diamond leads Mr. Muzzy discarded two small hearts and a small spade. Mr. Dale shed the six and deuce of spades and the four of hearts. On the fifth diamond Mr. Champion himself had to make a discard. He chose the seven of hearts.

Well, Mr. Champion had learned practically nothing about the location of the major suit kings. It was possible that both of them were wrong. But why guess?

Remembering that Mr. Dale's opening lead had indicated possession of only four clubs, Mr. Champion simply led a club. The plan was that Mr. Dale could run his two remaining clubs but would then have to lead into the ace-queen of either hearts or spades.

Very fine! Except that the old master rattled off three more clubs. Mr. Champion followed suit twice, then discarded the seven of spades. On the last club he was down to the ace and queen in both spades and hearts. He had a tough guess—and he guessed wrong. He dropped the queen of hearts.

Mr. Dale promptly led his lone king of hearts and Mr. Champion won with the blank ace. Mr. Muzzy had stubbornly held on to the king and one spade. Not because he figured it to be the right thing to do but because he always holds on to his highest cards. Anyway, he won the setting trick.

### THE EXPERTS Say...

Canadian Press Staff Writer Eggs are regarded with reverence at breakfast these days. Small wonder, when they can be bought under 70 cents a dozen in many places; when they are as high as 87 cents in Toronto.

Mother no longer tosses half a dozen eggs into an angel-cake for the church picnic. The family seldom sees an omelet any more. In other words—eggs have become a delicacy.

That's why—with tongue in cheek—we commend to Canadian housewives a little booklet issued from Ottawa, by the consumer section of the agriculture department's marketing service. It's tinted a bright egg-yolk yellow.

The title: EGGS. There's a soufflé recipe requiring four of the dainties. One—for an omelet—also requires four. Both are excellent. Even if you can't afford to try them now, file them away for the day when eggs are cheaper.

But in one way this pamphlet is timely. It contains hints on eggs buying, valuable to the homemaker who wants to get the most for her money.

**GRADE MARK IMPORTANT**  
In buying eggs, look for the grade mark "which must appear either on each end of the case, at the top of the carton or on a tag if the eggs are displayed in bulk—as in baskets."

Whenever possible, the pamphlet suggests, buy eggs from merchants who keep them under refrigeration. Eggs exposed to room temperature soon drop in quality.

After you've bought them; keep eggs in a cool place, preferably the refrigerator; keep them away from highly flavored food; do not wash eggs until just before using; leave eggs in the carton or keep in covered container.

**FRENCH TOAST**  
This is one of the less expensive recipes the booklet contains. It makes a good breakfast dish when you're wondering how to stretch two eggs among three persons.

Ingredients: two eggs; one cup milk; one tablespoon sugar (optional); one-half teaspoon salt; pepper; 6 1/2-inch slices bread, three tablespoons butter.

Blend together slightly beaten eggs, milk, sugar, salt and pepper. Dip both sides of each slice of bread into the mixture. Melt butter in frying-pan, brown slices of bread on both sides in hot fat. Place on a hot platter and serve at once. Yield: six slices.

This is particularly good if served with honey, maple syrup or corn syrup and bacon.

**ONE-EGG CAKE**  
Here is a personal recipe for an inexpensive medium-sized cake.

Ingredients: one-half cup butter (if using shortening use slightly less and add one-half teaspoon salt); one cup granulated sugar; one egg; three-quarters cup milk; 1 1/2 cups flour (sifted); two level teaspoons baking-powder.

Use a fork to mix this cake. Cream butter and sugar. Add egg and cream all together. Sift dry ingredients and add alternately with the milk.

Bake in a square (eight-by-eight inch) tin which has been greased to prevent sticking. Time: 35 minutes in a moderate oven.

This can be flavored or iced as desired. For orange cake add grated rind of one orange to mixture. Ice with mixture of icing-sugar and one tablespoon butter plus as much orange juice as required.
