Tour of Britain Inspires Local Girl to Achievement Of More in Musical Career

Settling down to her job at the National Employment Service office here after the highlight of her musical career to date—the three months' tour of the British Isles with the Elgar Choir—Barbara Teng tells the Daily News that music will still be an important part of her life and she is certainly going to keep on singing.

As a result of the fine experience she obtained on the tour, her ambition is to ultimately lead a choir herself. She has been inspired by the "marvellous" direction which the Elgar Choir receives from its veteran leader, C. E. Findlater.

The choir's trip abroad was a virtual tour of musical conquest. "Everywhere we went we were welcomed and acclaimed. There was nothing too much the people could do for us. Knowing that we were coming and were to be billeted, they even saved up their meagre rations to share with us. They were really wonderful."

The tour took in England, Scotland and Wales and there were sixty concerts with Dummerline, Scotland, the most northerly point. Glasgow and Edinburgh were also visited. The visit to Edinburgh, where the choir sang in the famous Princess Street Bowl, coincided with the "Gathering of the Clans" celebration where a thousand colorful pipers were gathered from all parts of the country and "there were so many people you just couldn't get close enough to see."

Numerous engagements in the London area included recitals in the suburbs of the metropolis including Wimbledon where they joined with 150 choral students, Mr. Findlater sharing the duties of director with the leader of the students.

Opportunity came to mingle with youth groups from the continent at Reading. "We sang for them and then we had a tour of the district with them."

In Wales there was a memorable experience. We sang to them and then the audience sang back to us "Guide me, O Thou Great Jehovah," a

number which Welsh people seem to sing everywhere they gather—in church, at social gatherings and even in the pubs. "It was like one big echo as the audience (every Welsh person can sing) sang back."

Barbara had the opportunity to visit at Seaford, Essex with her maternal grandmother, Mrs. Peckham, and took time out to go to Belfast, Ireland, where the parents of David Murphy, a locally known Presbyterian theological student, reside.

All the travelling in the British Isles was done by bus. Ireland, with its hills and greenery, seemed more like home.

"It's very picturesque. The people are just fine. But I don't think I'd like to live over there." Sailing home across the Atlantic, the choir party had a fairly rough crossing. They ran into the tail-end of a hurricane which had wrought disaster on Jamaica.

In Canada the choir had a booking at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto and also sang in First United and Dominion United Churches in the Ontario metropolis. In Winnipeg, Calgary, Jasper, Kamloops and Vancouver there were also recitals—not forgetting Tranquille Sanitarium where they sang for the patients including some Prince Rupert friends whom Barbara met.

Culminating event was a CBC radio broadcast on Sunday which Prince Rupert listeners heard.

Barbara has promised to share further of her experiences with Daily News readers by writing from her diary after she gets settled down again.

Co-Operation But Caution

U.S. Prepared to go Along with Russia But Must Stay Strong

WASHINGTON D.C. (AP)—President Truman said Thursday the United States will continue to seek agreements with Russia but will build up its armed strength to see that they are enforced.

Mr. Truman said that there is stronger possibility of preserving the peace as a result of the strengthened arms program and said the possibility will grow still stronger if the United States goes along with the defence program.

SHIPS AND WATERFRONT

With 18 passengers of the 102 who left Vancouver disembarking here, CPR steamer Princess Louise, Capt. Donald Hicks, arrived in port at 11 o'clock this morning from Vancouver and sailed a couple of hours later for Skagway and other Alaska points. Five persons took passage from here for the north. The passenger list contained a good proportion of round trip tourists.

Rains Hold Up Harvest

WINNIPEG—During the past five days harvesting operations have been resumed over much of the western provinces but in northern Saskatchewan further rains will delay operations another three to six days, according to the Weekly Crop Report of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railways.

Damage from sprouting is less than anticipated in many sections but grades have been reduced and considerable of the grain marketed is grading tough to damp.

Weather was warm and clear in the Okanagan where fruit is now moving in large volume. No further damage to the fruit crops is reported from any source.

Doctor-Nurse On Royal Tour

OTTAWA—A Canadian doctor and nurse have been assigned to attend Princess Elizabeth, Prince Philip and their party during the forthcoming Royal Tour of the Dominion. Col. J. M. B. Crawford of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps and Flying Officer Ella Beatrice Mannix RCAF, have been named.

Interior Radio Desert Ended

Last of Interior Repeater Stations Installed

The northern radio "desert" between Prince George and Prince Rupert has now been converted to fertile listening ground with the installation of the last of five CBC low-power transmitters. Residents of the area can hear the complete program service of the CBC's Trans-Canada network.

Four 20-watt transmitters were opened this week at Vanderhoof, Burns Lake, Hazelton and Terrace. Smithers joined the network during April.

These most recent installations bring the number of small transmitters in the province to nineteen. Reception is usually good within a radius of ten miles.

The transmitters are turned on in the morning and off at night by the telegraph agents; otherwise they are unstaffed.

The work has been under the supervision of F. B. C. Hilton, regional engineer for the corporation.
