## Fur Show Intriguing

Feature of Rotary Men's Tea Yesterday Afternoon

More than 300 women, sitting relaxed in the comfortable atmosphere of the Rotary Men's Tea Party yesterday afternoon, marvelled at 24 new and sparkling designs in fur presented by six models in an hour's show by Bill Scuby Furs.

And many a husband figured rapidly, how, if at all, a fur coat could be deductible from income tax, as model after model appeared in everything from a Canadian squirrel swag to a leopard-skin bathing suit.

Carrying the commentary to the piano music of Mrs. J. S. Black, Mrs. L. M. Greene introduced each model showing that the style this year followed a definite "pyramid" trend. Natural smooth shoulder lines falling to a full flared hemline and sleeves falling from narrow shoulders to a full-flare cuff, featured the general design in all styles.

Miss Bertha Boulton opened the show, displaying the first of the \$20,000 worth of merchandise with a mink-dyed Canadian squirrel swag which featured a winged collar, the pyramid styling, and turn-back cuffs.

And the onlookers were treated to sensational recovery from the past which started Tom Christie in a \$2000 mink ensemble like rich grandmother used to wear—mink coat, mink muff, hat, complete with hanging tails and all.

Each of the following models appeared four times, and each time displayed a different design to coax the enthusiasm of the attentive audience.

Noble—Black Hudson seal, made from sheared muskrat, featuring tailored collar and pockets concealed by vertical placement; natural muskrat, three-quarter length with full back opera cuffs and collar; the "Moonlight" trotter, in silver and blue tones in pyramid silhouette; soft Canadian squirrel jacket, dyed in tea black shade, featuring a small collar of interlaced design with wide cuffs adjusting to business or social wear.
