When Mrs. Keen bid two spades instead of two no trump on the third round of bidding in this deal, I think she was deliberately trying to throw the play of a no trump contract into her partner's hand.

Mr. Meek chose the ten of clubs for his opening lead. With practically no hesitation Mr. Masters played low from dummy and went right on up with the ace in his own hand. This seeming extravagance is not as silly as it looks. In fact it is the only play that will make the hand. Mr. Masters knew that he could take just two club tricks. What difference if he won the first and second or the first and third leads of the suit? The point was that he had to unblock the ace of clubs to make absolutely certain of an entry to dummy. He needed that entry to bring in the long diamond

suit after it was set up. LEADS SINGLETON The way he played the clubs left the queen and jack of the suit on the board and two little clubs in the closed hand. With this set-up the opponents could not keep him out of dummy unless they had two kings of clubs. At the second trick Mr. Masters led his singleton diamond to dummy's king. He followed with the ace of diamonds, throwing a small spade from his own hand. The ten of diamonds was led next and Mr. Abel won with the queen. Mr. Masters discarded the trey of hearts and Mr. Meek dropped the trey of clubs. Mr. Abel returned the jack of spades, which was covered with the king and won by Mr. Meek's ace. Mr. Meek cashed the queen of spades and led a third round of the suit. Mr. Masters won this trick with the eight of spades, shedding the seven of hearts from the board. Then he led a small club and Mr. Meek won with the king and desperately fired a heart. But Mr. Masters took the ace of hearts and led a club to dummy where all the rest of the cards were good.

## To Finish Up Street Signs

A concentrated effort will be made to finish planting 100 street signs this month, a project undertaken by Prince Rupert Junior Chamber of Commerce last year. There are 60 posts left to be planted, Archie Wudel, chairman of the committee reported at last night's annual meeting of the club. GEORGETOWN, British Guiana (C)—Miss Audrey Butt, an Oxford graduate, is getting her Doctor of Philosophy degree the hard way. She has chosen to make a survey of various social aspects of the American Indian tribes in British Guiana. Flying into the Mazaruni jungle, she plans to remain nine months among the Arecuna and Akowio tribes and later will fly to Chicago to consult with experts at University of Chicago. Miss Butt, who already has written a thesis on the organization of Eskimos, then will return to British Guiana for a two-year survey. Finally, she will submit a report on her findings to the government here and write her thesis for a Doctor of Philosophy degree. 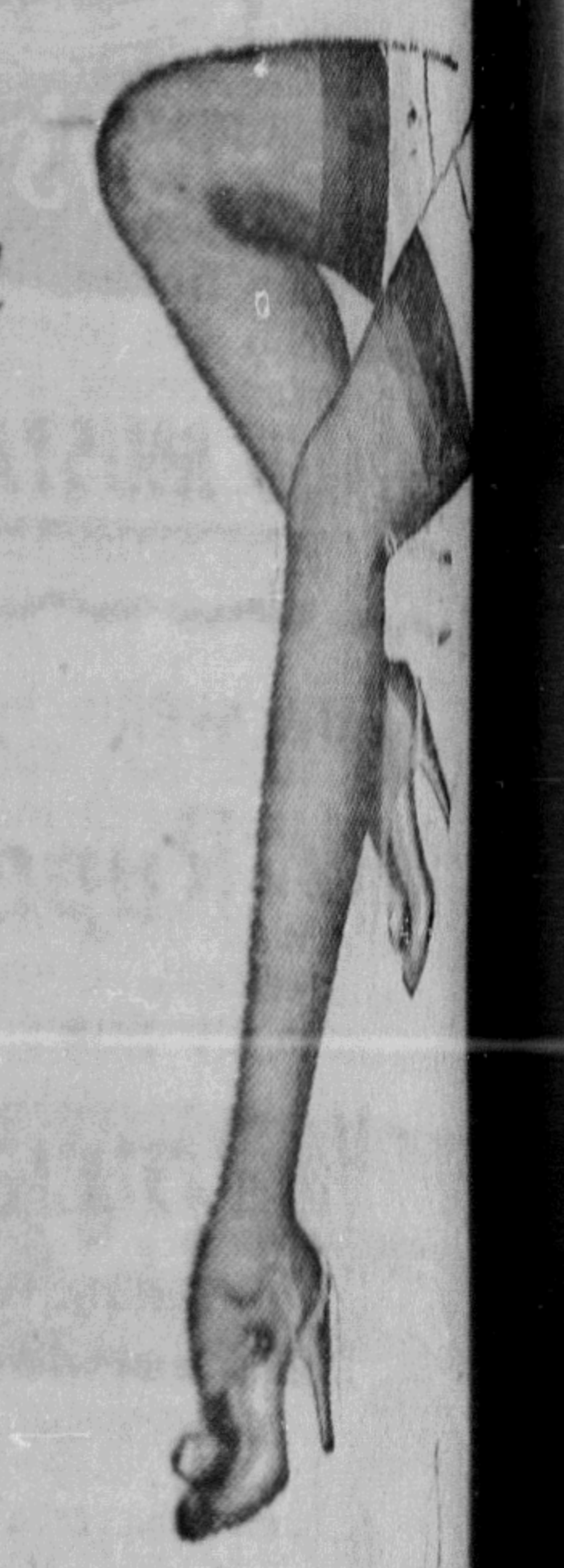

# Why was Hospital Insurance Started?

1. To relieve the people from paying large hospital bills.
2. To put the hospitals on a sound financial basis.
3. To help the overtaxed municipalities.

Let's look at the record—back to the years before Hospital Insurance. Towards the end of the war, and right afterwards, the rapid increase in the cost of running hospitals (due mainly to increased labor costs) made it necessary for the hospitals to raise their rates. A serious illness in a family was enough to wreck the finances of that family due to the large hospital bills. From all sides there were many strong demands for the provincial government to do something, and to do it quickly.

The action taken by the government to correct this situation was the start of Hospital Insurance on January 1st, 1949. The size of this huge undertaking was never overlooked, but the problems that had grown with the years could not be dealt with overnight.

While mistakes may have been made, they have been mistakes common to any large undertaking of this nature. Problems arose that had not been experienced anywhere else on this continent.

However, the net result of the plan is that the people of B.C. no longer need worry about staggering hospital bills for acute hospitalization which only three years ago could, and often did, cripple a family's finances. Now everyone has protection against large hospital bills, and the yearly premium for a family is less than 12c a day—less than one-third the price of a package of cigarettes.

The facts speak for themselves. Over 500,000 hospital bills have been paid on behalf of the people of B.C. This proves that the plan is fulfilling its original purpose of protecting the people from large hospital bills. Hospitals, on the other hand, are now in a position to operate on a sound financial basis and are steadily improving their buildings and equipment. The municipalities, in turn, have also benefited.

This, then, is why the Hospital Insurance Service was brought into effect in British Columbia. The article next week will deal with "Why were the premiums increased?"
